AN ACT relating to natural resources; establishing a 1 2 Wyoming environment and natural resources account; specifying uses of income from the account; establishing 3 4 procedures for expenditures of income from the account; 5 providing an appropriation; providing for future recommended appropriations; and providing for an effective 6 7 date. Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 8 9 Section 1. W.S. 9-15-101 through 9-15-104 are created 10 to read: 11 *** STAFF COMMENTS *** 12 This bill contains the three versions of the 13 wildlife trust fund proposals. The first alternative shown is from the version prepared 14 15 for the last Committee meeting, which was based 16 upon Mr. Magagna's group's proposal, with 17 modifications. It is shown in the standard font. 18

Alternatives suggested by the Governor's proposal immediately follow and are written in this font.

Alternatives suggested by the Wyoming Wildlife Federation follow the 1 Governor's and are indicated in this font. 2 3 4 The language of the alternative proposals is sometimes split and placed in different sections in order to follow 5 initial If 6 the draft. the Governor's or Wildlife 7 Federation's language was not substantively different from the current draft, the entire proposal was not repeated. 8 While the alternatives have not been changed substantively, 9 changes have been made to keep 10 minor the language stylistically the same as current statutes. 11 12 13 14 9-5-1xx Short title. 15 16 Governor - This article shall be known and may be cited as the "Wyoming Wildlife, Recreation and Conservation Permanent Account Act." 17 18 19 *** STAFF COMMENTS *** Neither of the other two versions contained a 20 21 The inclusion is not a significant short title. 22 issue. Whatever the Committee 27 decides will be inserted in the appropriate 28 places: 29 Current version - Wyoming environment and natural 30 31 resources trust account/board 32 33 Governor's = Wyoming wildlife, recreation and conservation permanent account/board. 34 35 WWF – Wyoming wildlife endowment board. 36 37 38 The name should be reflective of whatever the purposes 39 of the fund and the bill end up being. A suggested generic alternative was used for the catch title for 40 41 the time being - Wyoming wildlife and natural resource 42 funding act. 43 44 9-15-101. Definitions. 45 As used in this article: (a)

1 2 (i) "Board" means the Wyoming environment and 3 natural resources trust account board created by W.S. 9-15-4 103; 5 6 (ii) "Income account" the Wyoming means 7 environment and natural resources trust income account created by W.S. 9-15-102(b); 8 9 10 "Large project" means a project for which (iii) the grant sought under this article equals or exceeds one 11 12 hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00); 13 14 (iv) "Small project" means a project for which 15 the grant sought under this article is less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00); 16 17 18 "Trust account" means (V) the Wyoming 19 environment and natural resources trust account created by 20 W.S. 9-15-102(a). 21 22 Governor - uses "permanent account" and "current account" rather than "trust account" 23 and "income account". There is no demarcation of project amount in his proposal. 24 WWF – keeps all in one account and makes the income expendable. There is no 25 demarcation of project amount in that proposal. 26 27 28 WWF - "Recipient" means any nonprofit, individual or public agency that receives a grant from the Wyoming wildlife endowment. 29 30 31 9-15-102. Wyoming environment and natural resources 32 account created; income account created; expenditures; 33 purposes. 34 35 A trust account is created to be known as the (a) Wyoming environment and natural resources trust account. 36 37 The trust account shall consist of those funds appropriated to the trust account by law. Funds deposited within the 38 39 trust account are intended to be inviolate and constitute a perpetual trust account which shall be invested by the 40 state treasurer as authorized under W.S. 9-4-711 and in a 41 42 manner to obtain the highest return possible consistent 43 with preservation of the account corpus.

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Governor – additional language The permanent account shall consist of those funds designated to the account by law and all monies received from federal grants and other contributions, grants, gifts, transfers, bequests and donations to the permanent account. The permanent account is specifically empowered to accept grants, gifts, transfers, bequests and donations including those which are limited in their purposes by the grantor. Title to any interest in property conveyed to the permanent account shall be in the name of the board.

8 The state treasurer shall credit annually to a (b) 9 Wyoming environment and natural resources trust income 10 account interest earned of from investment the trust 11 account corpus. 12

- Governor With the exception of those funds specifically treated differently in this act, any interest earned from investment of the corpus of the permanent account shall be credited by the state treasurer into the current account within the trust and agency fund and distributed in accordance with this act.
- 18 The Legislature may, from time to time, appropriate funds directly to the current account 19 for distribution in accordance with the terms of this act. Such specially appropriated funds 20 shall be credited directly by the state treasurer to the current account and are available to 21 the board for award of grants as otherwise permitted by this act. 22
- Individuals and other entities may also grant, give, transfer, bequest or donate funds to the
 permanent account or the current account. Such funds shall be credited by the state
 treasurer to either the permanent or current account, as appropriate, in a manner
 consistent with the conditions attached to their receipt.
- WWF Any interest earned on the investment or deposit of monies in the fund
 shall also remain in the fund and shall not be credited to the general fund.
 Interest credited to the endowment fund shall be available for disbursement or
 expenditure by the board.

Projects must demonstrate that 23 this objective is central to the project through its entirety. Projects that address 24 critical wildlife or habitat needs or threats will receive highest ranking. Projects 25 which also provide tools to landowners, communities and groups to address any 26 of the following will receive high ranking as well: 27 Minimize human-wildlife conflicts associated with development or 28 (i)29 recreational use; 30 (ii) Protection of open space and Wyoming agricultural lands; (iii) Planning and management for maintaining wildlife values; 31 (iv) Supporting public access to public lands, and for private lands, using the 32 private lands/public wildlife program model; 33 (v) Involvement of youth as a component of the project; 34 (vi) Leverage of additional dollars and impact through matching funds, 35 cooperative efforts and other such mechanisms; 36 (vii) Showcase best management practices that can be a model for other efforts. 37 38 39 (d) No grant shall be made from the trust income 40 acquire account to purchase or any interest by а 41 governmental entity in real property nor to fund any

1 activity for which the power of eminent domain has been 2 exercised. 3 Governor - The Board shall not have the power of eminent domain and only has the 4 power to accept or dispose of an interest in property, whether in fee, by way of easement, 5 or otherwise, when the transaction with the Board is that of a willing conveyor of the 6 7 interest. 8 9 WWF - Funded projects 10 (i) Shall maintain public access in the project area where public access has historically 11 occurred: 12 (ii) Shall not use the power of eminent domain to acquire land or easements; (iii) Shall respect all property rights guaranteed by law; 13 14 (iv) Shall not be used to replace or fund on-going public agency operations. 15 9-15-103. 16 Board established; terms; duties. 17 (a) The environment and natural resources trust 18 account board is created to consist of: 19 20 One (1) member of the board of agriculture, (i) 21 appointed by the board; 22 23 One (1) member of fish (ii) the game and 24 commission, appointed by the commission; 25 26 (iii) One (1)member of the environmental 27 quality council, appointed by the council; 28 29 One (1) appointed member of the oil and gas (iv) 30 conservation commission, appointed by the commission; 31 32 One (1) member of the water development (V) 33 commission, appointed by the commission. 34 35 Governor - There is created the Wyoming wildlife, recreation and conservation permanent account board. The board shall consist of seven (7) members, as follows: 36 Three (3) persons appointed by the governor, subject to senate confirmation, who 37 (i) are representative of wildlife advocacy interests, sportsmen and tourism; and 38 Four (4) persons appointed by the governor from the following: 39 (ii) (A) Two (2) persons who are senate confirmed members of the game and fish 40 commission; and 41 Two (2) persons who are senate confirmed members of the board of agriculture. 42 (B) 43 WWF - There is created a Wyoming wildlife endowment board. The board 44

Of the initial appointees, two (2) members shall be appointed for one (1) year, two (2) members shall be appointed for two (2) years and three (3) members 29 30 shall be appointed for three (3) years. The governor may remove any member as provided in W.S. 9-1-202. Any vacancy occurring between sessions of the legislature may be filled 31 32 by the governor as provided under W.S. 28-12-101(b). The board shall select one (1) of its members to serve as chair. 33 34 35 WWF - Each appointed member of the board shall serve for a term of three (3) years. Any vacancy occurring between sessions of the legislature may be filled by 36 the governor as provided under W.S. 28-12-101(b). Not more than five (5) 37 appointed members shall be of the same political party. 38 39 40 One (1) member of the senate appointed by the (C) president of the senate and one (1) member of the house of 41 42 representatives appointed by the speaker of the house shall

Members shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in the manner 23 and amounts provided by law for state employees. 24 25 WWF - The board shall meet regularly. Members shall elect a chairman from its 26 27 members. 28 Members shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in the manner and amounts provided 29 by law for state employees. 30 31 32 The board shall receive and evaluate applications (e) 33 for grants from the income account. The board shall meet quarterly to review applications, approve projects 34 and

35 assure compliance with the terms of grants. The board may approve grants from the account for small projects. 36 Funds for small projects are continuously appropriated from the 37 38 income account for grants approved by the board. The board recommend to the governor the 39 funding of large mav 40 No funds shall be expended for large projects projects. except upon specific legislative appropriation of funds 41 from the income account. 42

The report should include an evaluation of 15 the effectiveness of the projects funded by the endowment fund. 16 17 18 The governor shall include in his proposed state (a) 19 budget submitted in accordance with W.S. 9-2-1013, his 20 recommendations for funding from the income account of projects submitted by the board under this section. 21 Until 22 the corpus of the trust account exceeds two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000.00) the governor shall also include 23 24 in his proposed state budget recommendations for additional funding of the corpus of the trust account. 25 26 27 9-15-104. Grant applications; eligible entities. 28 29 (a) Applications for grants from the income account 30 may be submitted by the: 31 32 (i) Game and fish commission; 33 34 (ii) Department of environmental quality; 35 36 Department of agriculture; (iii) 37 38 (iv) Livestock board; 39 40 (v) Oil and gas conservation commission; 41 42 (vi) Office of state lands and investments; 43 44 Water development commission; (vii)

1 2 (viii) Animal damage management board; 3 4 (ix) Any board of county commissioners; 5 6 Any local governmental entity whose primary (X) 7 is consistent with the stated objectives of the purpose 8 trust; 9 10 (xi) Any private entity in conjunction with an application submitted by one (1) of the entities specified 11 12 in paragraphs (i) through (x) of this subsection, may apply 13 for a grant for a small project. 14 15 Governor - The Board may only grant funds to nonprofit and governmental organizations. The board shall award grants to promote, preserve and enhance the unique wildlife and 16 environmental heritage of Wyoming and its people. 17 18 The board shall have the discretion to determine the amount of each grant and any 19 conditions attached to it. 20 For the purposes of this act, a grant may include the acquisition of an interest in real or 21 personal property. Grants by the Board are not intended to provide a supplement to, or replacement of, the 22 operating budget of any governmental agency or nonprofit organization except as those 23 24 funds are directly related to the purposes of the grant. 25 WWF - "Recipient" means any nonprofit, individual or public agency that 26 receives a grant from the Wyoming wildlife endowment. 27 28 29 Funded projects Shall maintain public access in the project area where public access has 30 *historically occurred;* 31 Shall not be used to replace or fund on-going public agency operations. 32 33 34 35 W.S. 9-15-1xx AUDITS. 36 37 Governor - The director of the department of audit or his designee shall audit the 38 permanent account biennially. Copies of the audit shall be provided to the governor and 39 the joint travel, recreation, wildlife and cultural resources interim committee. 40 41 WWF - The director of the department of audit or his designee shall audit the trust fund biennially. Copies of the audit shall be provided to the legislature. 42 43 44 WWF 9-15-1xx No expansion of state law. 45

1 WWF - Nothing in this act shall expand or limit the powers of the state currently set in law. 2 3 The legislature finds that 4 Section 2. Wyoming's natural resources are invaluable to the people of the state 5 and our progeny. A dependable source of funding should be 6 7 provided to support Wyoming's natural resource economy, including agriculture, tourism, mineral development, 8 and hunting and fishing through on-the-ground maintenance or 9 Wyoming's wildlife, 10 enhancement of wildlife habitat, 11 rangeland resources, open space and natural beauty. 12 13 Governor - The legislature finds: 14 15 (i) Wyoming possesses a unique wildlife and environmental heritage; (ii) Wyoming's unique wildlife and environmental heritage is vital to our citizens' 16 17 quality of life and our state's economy, now and for future generations; The development of Wyoming's mineral resource endowment will be 18 (iii) enhanced by allocating state resources to the maintenance and improvement of wildlife and 19 20 wildlife habitat: 21 (iv) Citizens' access to outdoor recreation, hunting and fishing, particularly on public lands, is a significant priority in Wyoming; 22 23 (v) Continued reliance on sportsmen's license fees and limited grants from the federal government is inadequate to maintain Wyoming's unique wildlife and environmental 24 25 heritage. 26 27 (b) It is the purpose of this act is to promote, preserve and enhance this unique Wyoming heritage by creating a Wyoming wildlife, recreation and conservation permanent account 28 29 administered by a citizen board to coordinate public and private donations and manage distribution of the investment earnings from the permanent account. 30 31 32 There is appropriated one hundred million Section 3. dollars (\$100,000,000.00) from the budget reserve account 33 34 to the Wyoming environment and natural resources trust.

 - WWF \$250,000,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Wyoming wildlife endowment fund.
- 41 Section 5. This act is effective July 1, 2005.
- 42 43 Governor – immediate.
