State assessment-accountability system-2.

A BILL

for

1 ACT relating to public education; specifying AN requirements for the statewide assessment of student 2 performance; establishing a statewide accountability system 3 4 for the state, school districts and schools with respect to 5 student performance; imposing duties upon superintendent of public instruction and a statewide task 6 7 force for statewide assessment and accountability; specifying assessment timelines and requiring a pilot test 8 for the assessment system; imposing reporting requirements; 9 10 providing an appropriation; and providing for effective 11 dates.

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13 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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15 **Section 1.** W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) and by creating a new

16 paragraph (vi) and 21-3-110(a)(xxiv) are amended to read:

2 21-2-304. Duties of the state board of education.

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4 The state board of education shall: (a)

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Through the state superintendent and in 6 (\vee) 7 consultation and coordination with local school districts, implement a statewide assessment system for measuring 8 9 comprised of a coherent system of measures that when 10 combined, provide a reliable and valid measure of 11 individual student achievement for each public school and 12 school district within the state, and the performance of 13 the state as a whole. Improvement of teaching and learning 14 in schools and fostering school program improvement shall be the primary purposes of statewide assessment of student 15 performance in Wyoming. The statewide assessment system 16 17 shall:

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19 (A) Measure individual student performance 20 and progress based upon in a manner substantially aligned 21 with the uniform educational program and student content 22 and performance standards imposed by law and by board rule and regulation; . The assessment system shall 23

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1 (B) Be administered at appropriate levels 2 at specified grades and at appropriate intervals aligned to 3 the standards, . The assessment system shall be aligned to the statewide educational program standards, shall 4 5 specifically <u>assessing</u> student performance reading, writing and mathematics at grades four (4), eight 6 7 (8) and eleven (11), and effective school year 2005-2006, and each school year thereafter, assessing student 8 9 performance in reading, writing and mathematics at grades 10 three (3) through eight (8) and at grade eleven (11). In addition and commencing school year 2007-2008 and each 11 school year thereafter, the statewide assessment system 12 13 shall assess student performance in science not less than 14 once within each grade band for grades three (3) through 15 five (5), grades six (6) through eight (8) and grades ten 16 (10) through twelve (12). The structure and design of the 17 assessment system shall allow for the comprehensive measurement of student performance through assessments that 18 19 are administered each school year simultaneously on a 20 statewide basis and through assessments administered 21 periodically over the course of the school year which are 22 designed to provide a more comprehensive and in-depth measurement of subject areas aligned to the state content 23 24 and performance standards. The assessment system may also

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1 measure the other common core of knowledge and skills 2 established under W.S. 21-9-101(b) which can be 3 quantified; -4 5 (C) In addition to subparagraph (a) (v) (B) of this section, measure student performance in Wyoming on 6 7 a comparative basis with student performance nationally; 8 9 Measure year-to-year changes in student 10 performance and progress in the subjects specified under 11 subparagraph (a) (v) (B) of this section and compare and evaluate student achievement during the process of student 12 13 advancement through grade levels. The assessment system 14 shall ensure the integrity of student performance 15 measurements used at each grade level to enable valid year-16 to-year comparisons; 17 18 (E) Include multiple measures and item types including grade appropriate multiple choice and open-19 20 ended testing such as constructed-response, extended-

21 <u>response and performance-based tasks, to ensure alignment</u>
22 <u>to the statewide student content and performance standards;</u>

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1	(F) Provide a fair and unbiased assessment
2	of student performance without regard to race, ethnicity,
3	limited English proficiency and socioeconomic status;
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5	(G) Provide appropriate accommodations or
6	alternative assessments to enable the assessment of
7	students with disabilities as specified under W.S.
8	21-9-101(c)(i) and students with limited English
9	<pre>proficiency;</pre>
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11	(H) Provide a measure of accountability to
12	enhance teaching and learning in Wyoming and in combination
13	with other measures and information, assist school
14	districts in determining individual student progress. The
15	assessment results <u>will</u> <u>shall</u> be <u>reported to students</u> ,
16	parents, schools, school districts and the public in an
17	accurate, complete and timely manner and shall be used in
18	conjunction with a school district's annual assessment to
19	design educational strategies for improvement and
20	enhancement of student performance. This design for
21	improvement shall be part of each district's school
22	improvement plan. In consultation and coordination with
23	school districts, the board shall review and evaluate the
24	assessment system regularly and based upon uniform

1 statewide reports from each district, annually report to

- 2 the legislature on student performance at specified grade
- 3 levels and on school improvement plans.

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- 5 (vi) Effective school year 2005-2006 and each
- 6 school year thereafter, through the state superintendent
- 7 and in consultation and coordination with local school
- 8 districts, by rule and regulation establish a statewide
- 9 accountability system providing annual accountability
- 10 determinations for all schools and school districts
- 11 imposing a range of educational consequences resulting from
- 12 accountability determinations whereby:

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- 14 (A) The continuous improvement of student
- 15 achievement at all schools and appropriate educational
- 16 interventions fostering continuous improvement serve as the
- 17 basis for statewide accountability system design;

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- 19 (B) Annual accountability determinations
- 20 within the system are made for each school based upon
- 21 adequate yearly progress measures defined by the federal No
- 22 Child Left Behind Act of 2001, as may be subsequently
- 23 amended, and the school's progress in improving student
- 24 achievement as measured by adequate yearly progress data

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1	and by data from the district's body of evidence assessment
2	system required under W.S. 21-3-110(a)(xxiv) and from other
3	related sources which improve the reliability of
4	accountability determinations as prescribed by rule and
5	regulation of the board;
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7	(C) To the extent possible, appropriate
8	consequences resulting from accountability determinations
9	are made subject to the discretion of school districts.
10	The system shall establish a range of consequences which
11	increase in the degree of intensity over time, with
12	significant interventions imposed only upon repeated
13	failure to meet school improvement and performance criteria
14	over a consecutive period of time;
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16	(D) Teacher and administrator quality and
17	student remediation are the focus of consequences imposed
18	upon schools failing to meet school improvement and
19	performance criteria and target levels;
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21	(E) A range of rewards is provided to
22	schools meeting school improvement and performance criteria

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at levels set by the state board.

1	21-3-110. Duties of boards of trustees.
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3	(a) The board of trustees in each school district
4	shall:
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6	(xxiv) Establish a student assessment system to
7	measure student performance relative to the uniform student
8	content and performance standards in all content areas for
9	which the state board has promulgated standards pursuant to
10	W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iii). To the extent required by the state
11	board under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) and (vi), the district
12	assessment system shall be integrated with the statewide
13	assessment system and the statewide accountability system.
14	A component of the district assessment system required by
15	this paragraph shall include a body of evidence assessment
16	system designed and used to determine the various levels of
17	student performance as described in the uniform student
18	content and performance standards relative to the common

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22	Section 2. [STATEWIDE TASK FORCE]
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The statewide task force established by 2003 1 (a) 2 Session Laws, Chapter 208, Section 201, and the state 3 superintendent shall continue the development, design and 4 oversight of the implementation of the statewide assessment 5 system prescribed by W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v), as amended by section 1 of this act, to be completed in sufficient time 6 7 implementation in the 2005-2006 school year. Any vacancy in the membership of the task force shall be filled 8 9 by the appointing authority prescribed under 2003 Session Laws, Chapter 208, Section 201(b). At its first meeting 10 11 following the effective date of this act, the task force 12 shall select a chairman from among its membership to 13 conduct task force meetings. For purposes of carrying out 14 the requirements of this section and to ensure the assessment system adheres to principles of sound education 15 policy and test measurement, necessary technical, policy 16 17 and legal experts and representatives from the education community and federal and state governmental agencies shall 18 be assembled on behalf of the task force and the state 19 20 superintendent.

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22 (b) In designing the statewide assessment system and overseeing the implementation of subsection (a) of this 23

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section, the task force shall ensure the assessment system

20 approximate portions of assessment items within

21 assessments administered periodically throughout the school

22 year and prescribing a process for establishing the use and

extent of periodic assessments within the statewide 23

24 assessment system.

2 (c) In addition to subsection (b) of this section, and the state 3 the task force superintendent 4 investigate the costs associated with consequences imposed 5 by the statewide accountability system established under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(vi) as amended under section 1 of this 6 act, which implicate state, school district and individual 7 response and action over and above existing 8 9 practices and levels of services provided in accordance 10 with requirements and programs in effect prior to 11 implementation of this system.

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13 Section 3. [STUDENT ASSESSMENT TRANSITION PROCESS]

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(a) In addition to section 2 of this act, the statewide task force and the state superintendent shall establish necessary mechanisms and processes to support the transition from the statewide student assessment existing on the effective date of this act to the student assessment system established in accordance with W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) as amended by section 1 of this act. The process shall satisfy legal and technical requirements pertaining to student assessment and shall provide for a pilot test of the statewide assessment to enhance assessment design and

1 development and to provide an empirical basis upon which to

2 make valid educational judgments on assessment results.

3 The pilot test of the assessment shall be administered

4 during the 2004-2005 school year to enable full

5 implementation of the statewide assessment in school year

6 2005-2006.

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specifications 8 (b) Based upon and requirements 9 developed by the task force under subsection (a) of this 10 section, the state superintendent shall develop 11 following review by the task force, issue a request for 12 proposal (RFP) for statewide student assessment development 13 in sufficient time for pilot testing during the 2004-2005 The task force shall assist the state 14 school vear. superintendent in reviewing and evaluating all proposals 15 16 submitted in response to the RFP. If a proposal meets the 17 specifications and requirements developed pursuant to this section and the proposal is approved by the task force, the 18 state superintendent shall accept the proposal and enter 19 20 into contract to implement the proposal subject to funds 21 available within the state superintendent's budget to 22 implement its provision. Prior to entering into contract, the state superintendent shall submit the proposal to the 23 24 state board for review.

2 (c) On or before November 1, 2004, the state 3 superintendent and the task force shall report to the state 4 board of education, the management council and the joint 5 education interim committee on recommendations developed section, clearly specifying progress on 6 under this 7 development of the statewide assessment system, defining the assessment system and reporting on the development and 8 9 administration of a pilot test for the assessment.

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Section 4. [ACCOUNTABILITY SYSTEM TRANSITION PROCESS]

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13 (a) For school year 2004-2005 and prior implementation of recommendations developed under this 14 section, the state superintendent and the statewide task 15 force shall establish a transitional plan to provide a 16 17 temporary system of rewards and sanctions for all schools and school districts. Prior to implementation, the 18 transitional plan shall be presented to the state board of 19 20 education and the joint education interim committee on or 21 before November 1, 2004. The transitional plan shall 22 terminate upon completion of the 2004-2005 school year.

- bill to become law as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of 13
- the Wyoming Constitution. 14
