for

1 AN ACT relating to the Wyoming superior undergraduate program for education reform; creating a separate account 2 3 within the earmarked revenue fund; establishing scholarships for attendance at Wyoming community colleges, 4 5 the University of Wyoming and other private institutions as specified; specifying eligibility criteria, conditions and 6 7 limitations; imposing duties on the Wyoming state board of 8 education and the department of education; delegating rulemaking authority; defining terms; imposing reporting 9 10 requirements; providing an appropriation; authorizing a position; and providing for an effective date. 11

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15 Section 1. W.S. 21-16-1201 through 21-16-1211 are 16 created to read:

1 2 ARTICLE 12 3 WYOMING SUPERIOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM 4 FOR EDUCATION REFORM 5 21-16-1201. Definitions. 6 7 (a) As used in this article: 8 9 (i) "Academic term" means the fall semester or 10 11 term or the spring semester or term. In this article, "term" and "semester" have the same meaning except that 12 13 recipients may elect to use the scholarship during summer school, which counts toward the maximum number of terms for 14 which the student is eligible but does not count toward 15 16 computation of an academic year; 17 (ii) "Academic year" means the period of time a 18 full-time student is expected to complete the equivalent of 19 20 at least two (2) semesters of academic work; 21 22 (iii) "Account" means the Wyoming superior undergraduate scholarship account established under W.S. 23 21-16-1202; 24

2 (iv) "ACT score" means a composite score on the 3 American College Test or an equivalent score on the 4 Scholastic Aptitude Test;

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6 (v) "Board" means the Wyoming state board of7 education;

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(vi) "Certificate" means a credential other than 9 10 a degree as defined in paragraph (vii) of this subsection, 11 which is either an associate of applied science degree or indicates satisfactory completion of training in a one (1) 12 year program of study offered by a Wyoming community 13 college or by an eligible institution accredited by an 14 accrediting agency recognized by the United States 15 department of education; 16

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18 (vii) "Degree" means a baccalaureate, an 19 associate of arts or an associate of science degree;

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21 (viii) "Department" means the Wyoming department
22 of education;

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(ix) "Eligible high school" means a public or 1 2 private secondary school that is located: 3 4 (A) In Wyoming and is accredited by the 5 state department of education; 6 7 (B) Outside Wyoming and is accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency. 8 9 10 (x) "Eligible institution" means the University of Wyoming, a Wyoming community college or a private post-11 12 secondary educational institution accredited by an 13 accrediting association recognized by the United States department of education and located in Wyoming; 14 15 (xi) "Grade point average" or "GPA" means the 16 17 numbered grade average calculated using a 4.0 scale; 18 19 (xii) "Scholarship" means an award provided 20 pursuant to W.S. 21-16-1204 and 21-16-1205; 21 22 (xiii) "Semester hour" means each nonremedial semester hour attempted for credit toward a degree or 23 certificate, excluding any semester hour attempted before 24

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earning a high school diploma or a general educational 1 2 development (GED) equivalency diploma; 3 4 (xiv) "Title IV" means Title IV of the federal 5 Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended. 6 21-16-1202. Wyoming superior 7 undergraduate scholarship account created; distributions 8 by state 9 treasurer. 10 11 (a) The Wyoming superior undergraduate scholarship 12 account is created within the earmarked revenue fund to 13 consist of funds appropriated or designated to the account by law, or by gift from whatever source, for distribution 14 in accordance with this article. 15 16 17 (b) The state treasurer shall distribute amounts within the account, at the request of the department of 18 education on behalf of the board, to each eligible 19 20 institution based on student participation. 21 21-16-1203. Wyoming superior undergraduate program 22 created; eligibility requirements. 23 24

(a) is created Wyoming superior 1 There the 2 undergraduate program for education reform (SUPER) for 3 Wyoming students, to be administered by the state board of 4 education through the state department of education. 5 6 Under the Wyoming SUPER program for students, the (b) 7 state shall provide a scholarship pursuant to W.S. 21-16-1204 and 21-16-1205 to any student who has been 8 9 accepted by and enrolls in an eligible institution to pursue a degree or certificate, and who meets the following 10 qualifications: 11 12 13 (i) The student has demonstrated residency by proof of the following, as required by rule and regulation 14 15 of the board: 16 The student has actually resided in 17 (A) Wyoming during the twenty-four (24) months preceding 18 enrollment in the eligible institution; 19 20 21 (B) If the student is registered to vote, 22 the student is registered in Wyoming; 23

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(C) If the student is licensed to drive a 1 2 motor vehicle, the student is in possession of a valid 3 Wyoming drivers license; and 4 If the student owns a motor vehicle 5 (D) located within Wyoming, the motor vehicle is registered in 6 7 Wyoming. 8 9 (ii) The student has a parent or guardian who is 10 a domiciliary of Wyoming; 11 12 (iii) The student has successfully completed a core curriculum and meets standards for admission to the 13 eligible institution. The core curriculum requirement of 14 this paragraph is in effect for students who apply for a 15 scholarship under this article for the first-time and who 16 17 enroll in an eligible institution in the fall of 2010, and 18 thereafter. As used in this paragraph, core curriculum means an educational program as established under W.S. 19 20 21-16-1206; 21

(iv) The student has no criminal conviction,
except for misdemeanor traffic violations excluding
conviction under W.S. 31-5-233; and

1 2 (v) The student has: 3 4 (A) Graduated from an eligible high school 5 or is otherwise eligible under rules promulgated pursuant to W.S. 21-16-1208(a)(iv); 6 7 (B) Applied for a scholarship under this 8 9 article within two (2) years of the date of high school graduation. The board shall by rule and regulation 10 11 establish exceptions to this requirement for military 12 service, religious service and other good cause shown; and 13 14 (C) The minimum high school cumulative grade point average and minimum composite score on the 15 American College Test specified under this article for the 16 17 type of scholarship to be awarded. 18 (c) Notwithstanding W.S. 21-16-1201(a)(ix), students 19 20 who are attending any high school in an adjoining state 21 pursuant to an agreement in effect as of July 1, 2005, 22 between the state department on behalf of the board and the local governing authority of the school in the adjoining 23 24 state, are considered to have graduated from a state

approved nonpublic high school for the purpose of
 qualifying under this article.

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4 (d) No student shall be eligible for a scholarship 5 pursuant to this article for more than eight (8) consecutive semesters or an equivalent number of units 6 7 comprising four (4) academic years in an eligible institution which operates on a schedule based on units 8 9 other than semesters, unless an extension is granted by the 10 board for cause pursuant to board rule and regulation.

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- 12 **21-16-1204.** Academic scholarships.
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14 (a) Any student who meets the criteria under W.S.
15 21-16-1203 is eligible to receive an academic scholarship
16 to pursue a degree as follows:

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(i) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA of 2.5 and at least a composite ACT score of 17, a scholarship for the cost of tuition for four (4) semesters at a Wyoming community college or other eligible institution offering certification within four (4) semesters;

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1 (ii) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA 2 of 3.0 and a composite ACT score of at least 20, a 3 scholarship for the cost of tuition and an allowance for 4 fees and books of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per 5 semester for eight (8) semesters; 6 (iii) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA 7 of 3.5 and a composite ACT score of 25, a scholarship for 8 9 the cost of tuition and an allowance for fees and books of 10 one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per semester for eight (8) 11 semesters. 13 (b) A student who receives a scholarship under

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paragraph (a) (i) of this section who earns at least forty-14 eight (48) credit hours at an eligible institution with a 15 16 cumulative GPA of 2.75 shall receive an additional 17 scholarship for the cost of tuition for four (4) additional semesters at the University of Wyoming if the student 18 maintains a cumulative GPA of 2.75 and otherwise remains 19 20 eligible for a scholarship under this article.

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22 (c) The cost of tuition for students enrolled in the 23 University of Wyoming or a Wyoming community college shall be the actual cost of tuition. For students enrolled at an 24

1 eligible two (2) year institution other than a Wyoming 2 community college, the cost of tuition shall be the lesser 3 of the actual cost of tuition or the average tuition cost 4 for all Wyoming community colleges. The cost of tuition for 5 students enrolled in an eligible four (4) year institution other than the University of Wyoming shall be the lesser of 6 7 the actual cost of tuition or the cost of tuition at the university. 8 9 10 To remain eligible for the scholarship award (d) 11 under this section, the student shall: 13 (i) Make steady academic progress toward a degree and earn not less than the minimum number of credits required for classification as a full-time student during each semester, or in the final semester before completion

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14 15 16 17 of the degree, the required number of hours necessary for completion. If a student fails to maintain the cumulative 18 grade point average required for continuation in the 19 20 program provided under paragraph (iv) of this subsection or 21 is placed on academic probation by the eligible institution attended, the student shall become ineligible for the 22 scholarship in subsequent semesters unless granted 23 an 24 exception for cause by the board or except as otherwise

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1 provided in this subsection. The scholarship under this 2 article may be reinstated for the subsequent semester upon 3 attainment of the cumulative grade point average required 4 under paragraph (iv) of this subsection, provided that the 5 period of ineligibility did not persist for more than two (2) years from the date of loss of eligibility; 6 7 (ii) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less 8 9 than two (2) semesters in each successive academic year, 10 unless granted an exception for cause by the board; 11 12 (iii) Have no criminal conviction, except for 13 misdemeanor traffic violations excluding a conviction under 14 W.S. 31-5-233; and 15 16 (iv) Maintain a cumulative grade point average 17 as evaluated at the end of each academic year as follows: 18 19 (A) For scholarships awarded under 20 paragraph (a) (i) of this section, at least a 2.25 GPA after 21 completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit; 22 23 scholarships (B) For awarded under 24 paragraph (a) (ii) of this section:

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1 2 (I) At least a 2.5 GPA after 3 completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit; 4 5 (II) At least a 2.75 GPA after completion of forty-eight (48) hours of credit; and 6 7 8 (III) At least a 2.75 after GPA completion of seventy-two (72) hours of credit. 9 10 (C) For scholarships 11 awarded under 12 paragraph (a) (iii) of this section: 13 14 least a 2.75 after (I) At GPA 15 completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit; 16 17 3.00 (II) At least a GPA after 18 completion of forty-eight (48) hours of credit; and 19 20 (III) At least a 3.00 GPA after 21 completion of seventy-two (72) hours of credit. 22 Not later than October 1, 2009, and by October 1 23 (e) each odd-numbered year thereafter, the board, 24 in in

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1 consultation with the University of Wyoming and the 2 community college commission, shall report to the governor 3 and the joint education interim committee of the 4 legislature on recommendations for modifications to the minimum cumulative GPA and minimum composite ACT scores 5 contained in this section to ensure that the SUPER program 6 7 is designed to provide the desired incentives for students to pursue a rigorous core curriculum and strive to achieve 8 9 academic success. 10 21-16-1205. Vocational technical scholarships. 11 12 (a) Any student who meets the criteria under W.S. 13 21-16-1203 is eligible to receive a vocational technical 14 scholarship to pursue a certificate as follows: 15 16 17 (i) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA of 2.0 and at least a composite ACT score of 15, a scholarship 18 for the cost of tuition for four (4) semesters; 19 20 (ii) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA 21 22 of 2.5 and a composite ACT score of at least 16, a scholarship for the cost of tuition and an allowance for 23

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1 fees and books of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) per 2 semester for four (4) semesters; 3 4 (iii) With a minimum cumulative high school GPA 5 of 2.75 and a composite ACT score of at least 17, a scholarship for the cost of tuition and an allowance for 6 7 fees and books of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per 8 semester. 9 (b) The cost of tuition for students enrolled in a 10 11 Wyoming community college shall be the actual cost of 12 tuition and for students enrolled at any other eligible institution, the actual cost of tuition or the average 13 14 tuition cost for students attending Wyoming community colleges, whichever is less. 15 16 17 (c) To remain eligible for the scholarship award under this section, the student shall: 18 19 20 (i) Make steady academic progress toward a 21 certificate and earn not less than the minimum number of 22 credits required for classification as a full-time student during each semester or in the final semester before 23 24 completion of the certificate, the required number of hours

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necessary for completion. If a student fails to maintain 1 2 the cumulative grade point average required for 3 continuation in the program provided in paragraph (iv) of 4 this subsection or is placed on academic probation by the 5 eligible institution attended, the student shall become ineligible for the scholarship in subsequent semesters 6 unless granted an exception for cause by the board and 7 except as otherwise provided in this subsection. 8 The 9 scholarship under this article may be reinstated for the 10 subsequent semester upon attainment of the cumulative grade 11 point average required under paragraph (iv) of this 12 subsection if the period of ineligibility did not persist 13 for more than two (2) years from the date of loss of 14 eligibility; 15

16 (ii) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less 17 than two (2) semesters in each successive academic year, 18 unless granted an exception for cause by the board;

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20 (iii) Have no criminal conviction, except for 21 misdemeanor traffic violations excluding any conviction 22 under W.S. 31-5-233; and

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1 (iv) Maintain a cumulative grade point average 2 as follows, as evaluated at the end of each academic year 3 for certificates that require more than one (1) academic 4 year: 5 scholarships 6 (A) For awarded under 7 paragraph (a)(i) of this section, at least a 2.0 GPA after completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit; 8 9 10 scholarships awarded (B) For under 11 paragraph (a)(ii) of this section, at least a 2.25 GPA 12 after completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit; 13 14 (C) For scholarships awarded under paragraph (a) (iii) of this section, at least a 2.5 GPA 15 16 after completion of twenty-four (24) hours of credit. 17 Not later than October 1, 2009, and by October 1 18 (d) each odd-numbered year thereafter, the board, in 19 in 20 consultation with the community college commission, shall 21 report to the governor and the joint education interim 22 committee of the legislature on recommendations for modifications to the minimum cumulative GPA and minimum 23 composite ACT scores contained in this section to ensure 24

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1 that the SUPER program is designed to provide the desired 2 incentives for students to pursue a rigorous core 3 curriculum and strive to achieve academic success.

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21-16-1206. Core curriculum.

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Not later than October 1, 2005, the board shall recommend 7 to the governor and the joint education interim committee 8 9 of the legislature, in consultation with the University of Wyoming, each Wyoming community college and the Wyoming 10 11 community college commission, the contents of an appropriate core curriculum for academic scholarship 12 13 students and, in consultation with the community colleges 14 and the commission, the contents of an appropriate core curriculum for vocational technical scholarship students. 15 The core curriculum and cumulative GPA requirements for 16 17 performance in the core curriculum shall, upon approval of the legislature, be adopted to enable students entering 18 high school in the fall of 2006 to pursue that curriculum 19 20 for scholarship eligibility under this article beginning 21 with the fall of 2010. In addition, the board shall, in 22 consultation with the University of Wyoming, each Wyoming community college and the Wyoming community college 23 24 commission, recommend components of the core curriculum to

1 be included in the criteria for eligibility for both the 2 academic and vocational technical scholarships during each 3 year of the phase-in of the SUPER program commencing with 4 the fall of 2006 through the fall of 2009, prior to 5 complete implementation in the fall of 2010.

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7 **21-16-1207.** ACT grants.

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9 To encourage all Wyoming students to challenge themselves 10 by taking the ACT test, from funds appropriated to the account by the legislature, the board through 11 the 12 department shall direct the state treasurer to distribute 13 funds from the account to Wyoming school districts 14 sufficient to ensure that all Wyoming students, including 15 those who are in private schools or who are in a home-based 16 educational program, may take the ACT test during their 17 junior year, grade eleven (11) or its equivalent, at no cost to the student. The grant amounts shall be made from 18 funds available within the account and shall be distributed 19 20 by the state treasurer at the request of the department, in 21 the manner and at times prescribed by rule and regulation 22 of the board.

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24 **21-16-1208.** Administration; rules and regulations.

2 (a) This article shall be administered by the 3 department on behalf of the board. The board shall 4 promulgate rules and regulations necessary to implement 5 this article, including: 6 7 (i) A means for informing all students of the availability of the scholarships under this article in 8 9 sufficient time to enable the student to plan for 10 completion of the required core curriculum; 11 12 (ii) Applications, forms, financial and program 13 audit procedures, eligibility and other matters related to efficient operation; 14 15 (iii) A procedure for waiver of the student's 16 requirement to complete the core curriculum upon proper 17 documentation by the high school's administrator or 18 authorized designee that failure to comply with the 19 20 requirement was due solely to the fact that a required 21 course was not available to the applicant at the school 22 attended; 23

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(iv) Criteria and procedures 1 under which 2 students in a home-based educational program and students 3 who received a general education development (GED) 4 equivalency diploma can qualify for scholarships under this 5 article. A student receiving a GED shall not be eligible for a scholarship under this article unless he scores a 6 7 minimum of six hundred (600) and received the GED no sooner than four (4) years following the graduation year of the 8 9 student's high school class; and 10 11 (v) Any other rules and regulations necessary 12 for the implementation and administration of this article. 13 14 (b) The board, through the department, shall establish an annual reporting procedure specifying funds 15 received and recipients enrolled during the preceding 16

17 academic year. The annual report by the board shall be 18 submitted to the governor and the legislature in accordance 19 with W.S. 9-2-1014.

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21 **21-16-1209.** Program eligibility.

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1 (a) A student is not eligible for a scholarship under 2 the Wyoming SUPER program established under this article if 3 the student: 4 5 (i) Is not a United States citizen or а permanent resident alien who meets the definition of 6 an 7 eligible noncitizen under federal Title IV requirements; 8 9 (ii) Has complied with United not States 10 selective service system requirements for registration, if 11 the requirements are applicable to the student; 12 13 (iii) Is in default on a federal Title IV 14 education loan. Nothing in this paragraph prohibits a student who is otherwise eliqible for a scholarship under 15 this article and has fully repaid a defaulted loan from 16 17 receiving a scholarship for future academic semesters; 18 19 (iv) Owes a refund under a federal Title IV 20 student financial aid program or a student financial aid

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program administered through the state. Nothing in this

paragraph prohibits a student from receiving a scholarship

for future academic semesters who is otherwise eligible for

1 a scholarship under this article and has fully paid the 2 refund owed; 3 4 (v) Would be ineligible for federal aid under 5 Title IV in accordance with the Drug Free Postsecondary Education Act of 1990 for conviction of a felony offense 6 involving a controlled substance; 7 8 9 (vi) Is incarcerated; or 10 11 (vii) Does not otherwise qualify under this 12 article for a scholarship. 13 14 21-16-1210. Certification of students. 15 (a) Each district board of trustees shall for any 16 17 high school under its jurisdiction, and the administrator of each nonpublic high school approved by the board shall, 18 using the criteria specified under W.S. 21-16-1204 and 21-19 20 16-1205 as minimum academic qualifications for selection, 21 identify and certify to the department and the board those 22 students graduating and achieving the required academic standards necessary to qualify for a scholarship under this 23 24 article.

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1 2 In addition to subsection (a) of this section, (b) 3 each district and the administrator of each nonpublic high 4 school approved by the board shall provide the department 5 and the board a certified list of students in grade eleven (11) or its equivalent for purposes of W.S. 21-16-1207. 6 7 Certification shall be on a form prescribed and provided by the department. 8 9 10 21-16-1211. Legislative oversight and authority. 11 12 Nothing in this article shall be construed to constitute an 13 entitlement to a scholarship established and funded by the 14 legislature. Wyoming superior undergraduate program scholarships shall be subject to legislative appropriation 15 and the legislature reserves the right to terminate the 16 17 program established under this article at any time. 18 Section 2. 19 20 21 (a) Twenty-seven million two hundred thousand dollars 22 (\$27,200,000.00) is appropriated from the general fund for purposes of implementing this act. Except for amounts 23

24 expended under subsection (b) of this section, this

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1 appropriation shall be deposited by the state treasurer in 2 the Wyoming superior undergraduate scholarship account 3 created by W.S. 21-16-1202 under section 1 of this act. 4 Amounts deposited within the account shall be expended by 5 the treasurer at the direction of the state board, through the department of education, for purposes of this act 6 7 including funding scholarships, ACT grants and other administrative costs. Amounts within the account shall not 8 9 revert on June 30, 2006, but shall remain within the account to fund scholarship and administration costs in 10 11 subsequent years.

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13 The department of education is authorized one (1) (b) full-time position necessary to administer this act on 14 behalf of the state board. This position shall be funded 15 16 from amounts appropriated under subsection (a) of this 17 section and shall be filled only upon approval of the state board. This position shall work directly for the board and 18 shall coordinate with the University of Wyoming, Wyoming 19 20 community colleges, private and home-based schools.

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(c) Funds for scholarships shall be distributed bythe board through the state treasurer to each eligible

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1 post-secondary education institution, college or the 2 university based on student participation.

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4 Section 3. This act is effective immediately upon 5 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law 6 as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming 7 Constitution.
