15	STATE DRUG WHOLESALER
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17	35-7-1601. Definitions.

1 2 (a) As used in this act: 3 4 (i) "Department" means the department of health; 5 (ii) "Pharmacy" means as provided in W.S. 6 7 33-24-124; 8 9 (iii) "Prescription drugs" means those 10 substances which are designated as dangerous substances under the provisions of W.S. 33-24-131 and which are named 11 12 and thereby included on a list of dangerous drugs, 13 medicines, poisons, chemicals and narcotics compiled by the 14 board of pharmacy. 15 16 35-7-1602. Generally. 17 (a) The department is the exclusive wholesale 18 19 distributor and seller of prescription drugs within 20 Wyoming. It is granted the sole right to sell prescription 21 drugs at wholesale to licensed pharmacies and no pharmacy that is granted the right to sell, distribute or receive 22 23 prescription drugs at retail shall purchase any 24 prescription drugs from any source other than the

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1 department, unless otherwise expressly authorized by state
2 law. Any out-of-state shipment of prescription drugs into
3 this state is prohibited unless otherwise expressly
4 authorized by state law.

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6 (b) The department, in consultation with the board of 7 pharmacy, shall promulgate rules and regulations as it 8 considers necessary to carry out this article. Rules 9 promulgated pursuant to this subsection shall be consistent 10 with applicable laws and regulations of this state and of 11 the United States.

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13 (c) The director of the department shall direct 14 audits, inspections and other investigations as the 15 director considers necessary for the enforcement of this 16 article and the rules and regulations of the department.

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(d) On or before October 1 of each year, the 18 department shall submit to the legislature financial 19 20 the operation of the department's statements on 21 prescription drug wholesale distribution activities. The 22 statements shall be prepared in accordance with generally 23 accepted accounting principles and itemize shall all

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amounts actually paid to prescription drug manufacturers, 1 2 wholesalers or other suppliers. 3 4 35-7-1603. Collection of taxes; disposition of 5 revenue and fees. 6 7 The department shall collect all excise or other (a) taxes provided by law relating to prescription drugs for 8 9 deposit into the general fund. 10 11 (b) All other revenue and fees collected by the 12 department shall be deposited into the state treasury to 13 the credit of the enterprise fund except as otherwise 14 provided by law. The legislature shall authorize expenditures as necessary to defray the administrative 15 16 expenses of the department, including salaries, office 17 expenses and general expenses for the enforcement of their duties under this article and sufficient funds to defray 18 the cost of prescription drug purchases and attendant 19 20 expenses as provided by W.S. 9-4-204(o) and 9-4-205(d). 21 22 35-7-1604. Purchase and sale of prescription drugs; 23 shortages.

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1 (a) The department shall purchase and sell 2 prescription drugs to licensed pharmacists within the state 3 including, at the discretion of the department, any retail 4 distributors or permittees operating within any military 5 post or national park located within the boundaries of the state of Wyoming. Except as provided in subsection (c) of 6 7 this section, sales shall be made at prices sufficient to return the cost of merchandise and all expenses of 8 9 operation together with a profit, not to exceed seventeen 10 and six-tenths percent (17.6%) above the cost of the 11 merchandise.

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(b) In the case of a shortage in the supply of any prescription drug, the department may apportion its available supply among licensed pharmacists in an equitable manner.

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(c) The department may sell a prescription drug at a price less than that provided in subsection (a) of this section if the prescription drug has been designated by the division as overstocked or has been removed from the department's published listing of prescription drugs to be kept for sale to pharmacies. For purposes of this section "overstocked" means the amount of the prescription drug in

1 the department's inventory is greater than would be sold in 2 a twelve (12) month period. 3 4 35-7-1605. Inspections and examinations; failure to 5 permit entry. 6 7 The department through its employees or agents (a) may enter and inspect at any time every place of business 8 9 wherein prescription drugs are being sold, stored or kept 10 by any pharmacy. 11 12 The department through its employees or agents (b) 13 may examine the records, books of account and stock of 14 prescription drugs of any pharmacy. 15 16 (c) If the operator of any pharmacy refuses to permit 17 the entry of an agent of the department to his place of business or storage place for the purpose of inspection, 18 19 his license may be revoked as provided by the Wyoming Pharmacy Act. 20 Entry for purposes of inspection is 21 authorized only during open business hours unless it is in 22 the presence of the pharmacist in charge or his duly authorized representative or unless the officer making 23 24 entry does so under court order or has reasonable grounds

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to believe that evidence of any violation of this title is 1 2 within the place to be entered. 3 4 35-7-1606. Sales to violators prohibited; hearing and 5 review. 6 7 Whenever the operator of any pharmacy is convicted of willfully violating any provision of this article, upon 8 9 satisfactory proof of the conviction, the department may, 10 after notice and hearing, refuse to sell prescription drugs 11 to the operator or pharmacy. The administrative proceeding 12 shall be conducted as a contested case before a hearing 13 examiner of the office of administrative hearings, who 14 shall recommend a decision to the department. Judicial review, if any, shall be from the decision of the 15 16 department and in accordance with the provisions of the 17 Wyoming Administrative Procedure Act.

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19 35-7-1607. Sales to pharmacies failing to pay sales
 20 tax prohibited; hearing and review.

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22 Upon certification by the department of revenue that any 23 pharmacy is sixty (60) or more days delinquent in paying 24 sales taxes, the department shall not sell prescription

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1 drugs to the pharmacy or its operator until the department 2 of revenue certifies that the pharmacy has paid all sales 3 taxes owed. Upon receipt of certification, the department 4 shall notify the board of pharmacy of the delinquency. The 5 operator of the pharmacy shall be allowed a hearing before the state board of equalization as provided by the Wyoming 6 7 Administrative Procedure Act if the operator feels aggrieved by any action taken under this section. 8 9 10 Section 2. W.S. 33-24-122(a) creating by new 11 paragraph (xi) is amended to read: 12 13 33-24-122. Revocation or suspension of license and letter 14 registration; of admonition; administrative 15 penalties; probation; grounds. 16 17 (a) The license and registration of any pharmacist may be revoked or suspended by the board of pharmacy or the 18 board may issue a letter of admonition, refuse to issue or 19 20 renew any license or require successful completion of a 21 rehabilitation program for any of the following causes: 22

1	(xi) Knowing purchase of prescription drugs from
2	any source in violation of W.S. 35-7-1601 through
3	<u>35-7-1607.</u>
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5	Section 3. Five hundred thousand dollars
6	(\$500,000.00) is appropriated from the general fund to the
7	enterprise fund as the working capital for the program
8	established by this act.
