(B) Alternative schools qualifying for separate consideration under the education resource block grant model may be established by a school district for offering educational programs to students with educational needs which the district finds are not appropriately met by

1 purpose of the school and the intent to serve a specific 2 student population benefiting from an alternative learning environment, excluding charter schools established under 3 4 W.S. 21-3-301 through 21-3-314. Alternative schools 5 included within a district's configuration of schools identified under paragraph (iv) of this subsection shall 6 7 for purposes of the education resource block grant model: be subject to subdivision (III) of this subparagraph and 8 9 meet either subdivision (I) or (II) of this subparagraph: 10 11 (I) Be approved as an alternative 12 school by the department of education; prior to July 1, 2006; 13 14 (II) After July 1, 2006, Through 15 teachers and accompanying staff, within the alternative 16 17 school facility, provide a program at the middle and high school level in an alternative learning environment, that 18 complies with criteria established by rule and regulation 19 20 of the department, the primary purpose of which is to 21 provide intensive educational programs to identified at-22 risk student populations with multiple emotional and 23 behavioral issues who require special attention and cannot 24 be served in a traditional education environment;

1 2 (III) Unless otherwise authorized by 3 the state superintendent in accordance with this 4 subparagraph, restrict school enrollment to not more than 5 forty-nine (49) ADM; 6 7 (IV) Provide the required statewide educational program prescribed under W.S. 21-9-101 and 8 9 21-9-102 and secure state board accreditation under W.S. 10 21-2-204(a)(ii); 11 12 (V) Not be required to be located in a 13 separate building or physical facility but may be situated 14 within an existing district middle or high school facility; 15 (III) (VI) Unless otherwise authorized 16 17 by the state superintendent, be restricted to not more than one (1) alternative school for each high school and middle 18 19 school included within any school district the district's 20 configuration of schools pursuant to paragraph (iv) of this
