6	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

8	Section 1. W.S. 27-14-104(a) is amended to read:
9	
10	27-14-104. Exclusive remedy as to employer;
11	nonliability of co-employees; no relief from liability;
12	rights as to delinquent or noncontributing employer.
13 14	(a) The rights and remedies provided in this act for
15	an employee including any joint employee, and his

incurred in 1 dependents for injuries extrahazardous 2 employments are in lieu of all other rights and remedies 3 against any employer and any joint employer making 4 contributions required by this act, or their employees 5 acting within the scope of their employment unless the 6 employees intentionally act intended to cause physical harm 7 or injury to the injured employee, but do not supersede any rights and remedies available to an employee and his 8 9 dependents against any other person. The co-employee 10 immunity provided by this section shall immunize co-11 employees for all workplace injuries except those specified 12 and co-employees shall not be liable for workplace injuries 13 upon any other cause of action or theory of recovery, 14 including but not limited to negligence, gross negligence, 15 culpable negligence, recklessness and willful and wanton 16 misconduct.

18 Section 2. It is the intent of the legislature in passing this act to change the effect of the holding in the 19 20 Wyoming Supreme Court decision in Bertagnolli V. 21 Louderback, 2003 WY 50, 67 P.3d 627 (2003) and provide that 22 co-employee liability shall be limited as provided by this 23 act.
