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1 HB0005 1 (a) Except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) of

2 this section, no person shall possess, purchase, sell,

3 offer to sell or use an alcohol without liquid device.

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5 (b) This section shall not apply to a hospital that

6 operates primarily for the purpose of conducting scientific

7 research, a state institution conducting bona fide

8 research, a private college or university conducting bona

9 fide research or to a pharmaceutical company or

10 biotechnology company conducting bona fide research.

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12 (c) This section shall not apply to an individual who

13 possesses a prescription, from a licensed Wyoming

14 physician, that allows for the use of an alcohol without

15 liquid device for legitimate medical purposes.

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17 (d) Any person who violates subsection (a) of this

18 section is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of

19 not more than seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00),

20 imprisonment for not more than six (6) months, or both.

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22 (e) As used in this section "alcohol without liquid

23 device" means a device, machine, apparatus or appliance

24 that mixes alcoholic liquor with pure or diluted oxygen to

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1 produce an alcohol vapor that an individual can inhale. An

2 alcohol without liquid device does not include an inhaler,

3 nebulizer, atomizer or other device that is designed and

4 intended by the manufacturer to dispense a prescribed or

5 over-the-counter medication.
