- 10 **Section 1.** W.S. 11-6-107, 11-6-201, 11-6-202,
- 11 11-6-203(a)(intro), (i), (ii) and (b), 11-6-204, 11-6-205,
- 12 11-6-206, 11-6-207(a), (b) and (d), 11-6-208, 11-6-209,
- $13 \quad 11-6-210(a), (d), (f), (g)(intro) and (iii), (m) and by$
- 14 creating a new subsection (n), 11-6-302(a)(viii), (xi) and

Disposition of proceeds. 5 All predator furs, skins and specimens taken by hunters or 6 trappers whose salaries are paid in full by cooperating 7 agencies, shall be sold and the proceeds returned to the 8 9 respective predatory animal predator management district of 10 the county in which the furs, skins or specimens 11 originated. All receipts from sales of materials and services related to predatory animal and rodent control 12 13 received by the department shall be paid into the state 14 general fund. 15 11-6-201. Creation and designation of districts; 16 17 state predator management advisory board. 18 19 (a) Each county is created and designated as a 20 predatory animal predator management district. Each 21 district shall be known as the "Predatory Animal Predator

1 (b) There is created a state predatory animal 2 predator management advisory board composed of one (1) 3 representative of each predatory animal predator management 4 district. The state predatory animal predator management 5 advisory board representative shall be appointed by the individual predatory animal predator management district 6 7 boards of directors and so designated in writing. 8 11-6-202. Administration of districts by district 9 boards; number and qualifications of members; term; filling 10 of vacancies. 11 12 13 (a) The affairs of each district shall administered by a board of directors, each of whom shall be 14 a bona fide resident of Wyoming. Directors for the 15 positions identified in paragraphs (i) and (ii) of this 16 17 subsection shall be elected at an annual meeting of district livestock owners. Directors for the positions 18 19 identified in paragraphs (iv) and (v) of this subsection 20 shall be appointed as described. The composition of the 21 board shall be as follows: 22 Three (3) directors shall be sheep or goat 23 (i) 24 owners having paid taxes or predatory animal control

1 predator management fees on sheep or goats in the district 2 in the year preceding election. At each subsequent annual 3 district meeting one (1) director shall be elected for a 4 three (3) year term. All sheep or goat owners whether an 5 individual, corporation or partnership, having paid taxes or predatory animal control predator management fees on 6 sheep or goats in the district regardless of the domicile 7 of the sheep or goats, are entitled to one (1) vote at the 8 9 meeting; 10 (ii) Three (3) directors shall be cattle owners 11 12 having paid taxes or predatory animal control predator 13 management fees on cattle in the district in the year preceding election. At each subsequent annual district 14 meeting one (1) director shall be elected for a three (3) 15 16 year term. All cattle owners whether an individual, 17 corporation or partnership, having paid taxes or predatory animal control predator management fees on cattle in the 18 district regardless of the domicile of the cattle, are 19 20 entitled to one (1) vote at the meeting; 21 22 (iii) If a qualified applicant for a director position identified in paragraph (i) or (ii) of this 23 subsection cannot be found or if no qualified applicant 24

1 seeks election to the board of directors, then the director 2 position may be filled by an otherwise qualified elector 3 owning another of the livestock species, provided no more 4 than four (4) directors may represent any one (1) species 5 of livestock; 6 7 (iii)(iv) If the board of county commissioners determines that additional county funds are necessary for 8 9 an adequate predator control management program, and county 10 funds are appropriated for that purpose, the board of 11 county commissioners may appoint one (1) director to serve 12 for an initial term of two (2) years and thereafter for 13 three (3) year terms from electors in the county not 14 engaged in raising sheep, goats or cattle. No appointed member may serve for a consecutive period of more than six 15 (6) years; -16 17 (v) If the board of directors determines state 18 19 funds are necessary for an effective predator management 20 program to assure the statutory requirements provided in 21 W.S. 11-6-205 are fulfilled and state funds are 22 appropriated and received for that purpose, then three (3) 23 directors representing sportsmen and hunters from the

district shall be appointed to the board of directors by

24

1 the county commissioners serving the local district. 2 Sportsmen and hunter representatives shall be bona fide 3 residents of the district and shall hold or have held 4 either a valid Wyoming fishing or hunting license or a 5 Wyoming wildlife damage management stamp within the preceding twelve (12) month period. County commissioners, 6 7 to the greatest extent practical, shall select sportsmen and hunter representatives to ensure representation from as 8 9 broad a geographic distribution of the district 10 possible. The county commissioners shall determine who of 11 the three (3) sportsmen and hunter directors appointed to a board under this paragraph shall serve an initial term of 12 13 one (1) year, who shall serve an initial term of (2) years 14 and who shall serve a term of three (3) years. Thereafter, 15 each term shall be for three (3) years. 17 No director shall continue to hold office after

16

disqualification under any of the provisions of this 18 section. All vacancies on the district board may be filled 19 20 for unexpired terms by the other directors in office except 21 the public member's and the sportsmen and hunter member's 22 unexpired term shall be filled by board of county 23 commissioners appointment. Manner of calling annual meeting of sheep, 3 goat and cattle owners; when held; election of chairman and 4 secretary. 5 The annual meeting of each predatory animal 6 (a) predator management district shall be in held within the 7 first two (2) weeks of December and each board shall: 8 9 (i) On or before December 1, obtain an accurate 10 11 list of all persons assessed for taxes or who have paid predatory animal control predator management fees on sheep, 12 13 goats or cattle in the district; 14 15 (ii) Publish a notice stating the time and place 16 of any meeting of the district and that directors of the 17 board representing livestock interests as provided in W.S. 11-6-202(a)(i) and (ii) shall be elected at the meeting. 18 Notice shall be published once in a newspaper of general 19 20 circulation in the district ten (10) days prior to the date 21 of the meeting; 22 (b) When assembled in accordance with the provisions

23 of the notice subsection (a) of this section, the sheep, 24

1 goat and cattle owners shall elect a chairman and secretary

- 2 who shall act as judges of the election of directors
- 3 representing livestock interests of the board.

19 board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business

20 at any board meeting. The members of the board shall

21 receive no compensation for serving as members. Each

24 appropriation of funds from the board of county

1 2 (iv) Coordinate with affected individuals and entities to develop a comprehensive predator management 3 4 program for each respective predator management district 5 which addresses livestock, wildlife and public health 6 concerns. 7 11-6-206. District boards; powers generally. 8 9 Each predatory animal predator management district board

10 11 may adopt rules and regulations necessary for carrying out the purpose and provisions of this article. Each board may 12 13 appoint employees and assistants as necessary and fix their 14 compensation. Each board may enter into cooperative agreements with boards of county commissioners, other 15 predatory animal control predator management districts, 16 17 federal or state agencies or other organizations or associations for the purpose of controlling predatory 18 19 animals and predacious birds. Each board is authorized to 20 pay bounties for predatory animals and predacious birds.

2 (a) The secretary-treasurer of each predatory animal
3 predator management district shall keep a complete and
4 accurate record of the proceedings of the board.

6 (b) All salaries, expenses or bounties shall be paid
7 from the <u>predatory animal predator management</u> district fund
8 of the district by the secretary-treasurer. and recorded in
9 a cash book.

11 (d) The county treasurer shall issue monthly warrants
12 to the <u>predatory animal predator management</u> district for
13 all monies collected in the county for the <u>predatory animal</u>

On or before January 1 of each year, the president and secretary-treasurer of each district board and each county treasurer shall make an annual report to their board of county commissioners showing all receipts and disbursement of district funds made by direction of the board during the preceding calendar year. A report of the receipts, expenditures and financial transactions of the district

1 shall be made as provided by W.S. 9-1-507. The director of

2 the state department of audit may call upon any district

3 board or upon any county treasurer for further information

4 relating to any predatory animal predator management

5 district.

7 11-6-209. Annual meetings of sheep and cattle owners.

9 Annual meetings for the election of members of boards of

10 directors of predatory animal predator management districts

11 shall be called by the president of each board. The

12 meetings shall be called by a notice published in the

manner provided by W.S. 11-6-203.

15 11-6-210. Creation of predator management district

16 fund; predator management fees; donations; appropriation by

17 county commissioners.

18

19 (a) At the time of collecting brand inspection fees

20 imposed under W.S. 11-20-401 and 11-20-402, the brand

21 inspector shall collect predatory animal control predator

22 management fees on all sheep, goats and cattle inspected

23 within each predatory animal predator management district.

24 However, predator control management fees shall not be

1 collected on cattle, and sheep and goats shipped into this 2 state for immediate sale or slaughter. The amount of the 3 fee for each predatory animal predator management district 4 shall be established by each predatory animal predator management district board in consultation with the state 5 predatory animal predator management advisory board and 6 7 shall not exceed eighty cents (\$.80) one dollar (\$1.00) per head on sheep, goats and fifty cents (\$.50) per head on 8 9 cattle. The directors elected pursuant to W.S. 10 11-6-202(a)(i) and (ii) from each predatory animal predator 11 management district board shall annually determine the 12 predatory animal control predator management fee to be 13 charged and collected in the district based upon a 14 recommendation of the majority of taking into consideration comments solicited from the producers present at the 15 district's annual meeting as provided for in W.S. 11-6-203, 16 17 who have paid predator management fees within the district during the preceding twelve (12) months and shall inform 18 the livestock board of the fee prior to January 1 each 19 20 year. The fee shall not be collected on the same livestock 21 more than once in any twelve (12) month period. 22 livestock board may retain not to exceed three percent (3%) 23 five percent (5%) of the revenues collected for the actual 24 cost of administering the program collecting the predator

1 management fee. Remaining revenues collected by the 2 livestock board under this section shall be remitted to the state treasurer for deposit in an account. The state 3 treasurer, on a quarterly basis, shall distribute the 4 5 revenues to the county treasurer of the county from which the shipment originated unless, at the time of payment of 6 the fees, the livestock owner designates the fees to be 7 distributed in total to another county in this state in 8 9 which the livestock are fed or pastured. The county 10 treasurer shall deposit revenues distributed under this 11 subsection into a special continuing fund, to be known as the "Predatory Animal Predator Management District Fund of 12 13 County" and to be administered by the predatory animal 14 predator management board of that district. 16 The district board may receive donations and (d) 17

appropriations of money from any source, and such donations and appropriations shall be placed in the district fund by 18 the county treasurer upon request of the district board. 19 20 in W.S. 11-6-201 through 11-6-210 shall 21 construed to prohibit boards of county commissioners from 22 appropriating funds for the purpose of controlling 23 predatory animals and predacious birds, and such

4 (f) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, 5 the amount of the annual predatory animal control predator management fee for sheep, goats and cattle shipped into 6 this state for confinement in a commercial feedlot shall 7 not exceed fifteen cents (\$0.15) twenty-five cents (\$0.25) 8 9 per head on sheep, goats and five cents (\$0.05) per head on 10 cattle. For purposes of this subsection, "commercial 11 feedlot" means any place, establishment or facility commonly known as a feedlot conducted, operated or managed 12 13 for profit or nonprofit for livestock producers, feeders or 14 agencies, consisting of pens and appurtenances, in which livestock are received, held, fed, 15 cared for or kept for sale or shipment in commerce. A 16 17 pasture, field or other enclosure, fenced or unfenced, shall not be considered a commercial feedlot for purposes 18 19 of this subsection. The predatory animal predator 20 management district board shall have the authority to 21 determine if a facility qualifies as a commercial feedlot 22 as defined in this subsection.

23

1 (g) After January 1, 1992 each predatory animal predator management district board shall annually allocate 2 3 five percent (5%) of all predator management fee 4 collections to be used for refunds, in whole or in part. 5 If a refund is requested the board shall pay the refund within one hundred eighty (180) days of application. 6 Refunds under this subsection shall be subject to the 7 following: 8 9 (iii) All monies not paid in refunds shall 10 11 annually revert to the district predatory animal control 12 predator management account on December 31 July 1 of the 13 following year. 14 (m) After July 1, 2002 and before December 1, 2002, a 15 predatory animal predator management district board may 16 17 hold a special meeting during which an adjustment of the predatory animal control predator management fee set under 18 subsection (a) of this section may be made for the balance 19 20 of calendar year 2002. The special meeting shall be held 21 pursuant to the procedures found in W.S. 11-6-203(a)(ii) 22 and (iii) except that the notice shall state the time and place and that a fee increase shall be considered. 23 24 board shall immediately notify in writing the livestock

- 1 board of any fee adjustment made under this subsection.
- 2 The fee adjustment shall take effect thirty (30) days after
- 3 the date of mailing of the notice to the livestock board

4 and shall remain in effect through December 31, 2002.

- 6 (n) If a livestock producer requests predator

8	districts, federal or state agencies or other commissions,

- 6 (a) There is appropriated from the general fund to
- 7 the department of agriculture ten million dollars
- 8 (\$10,000,000.00) to fund the predator management program as
- 9 follows:

- 11 (i) Three percent (3%) of the general fund
- 12 appropriation shall be appropriated to the department of
- 13 agriculture to administer the predator management program.
- 14 There is authorized one (1) additional full-time position
- 15 for the department of agriculture for the purposes of
- 16 administering the predator management program;

- 18 (ii) Nine million seven hundred thousand dollars
- 19 (\$9,700,000.00) shall be distributed by the department of
- 20 agriculture through the Wyoming animal damage management
- 21 board to local predator management district boards who may
- 22 apply for grants to supplement and enhance predator
- 23 management efforts only after committing revenues from
- 24 predator management fees and from other sources intended

1 for that purpose. The application criteria for the predator 2 management boards to receive supplemental funds through a 3 competitive granting process shall be established by the 4 Wyoming animal damage management board and promulgated by 5 rule by the animal damage management board. The criteria shall include but not be limited to the cost of full-time 6 and part-time trappers and the cost of fixed wing aircraft 7 and helicopters, for predator management for livestock and 8 9 wildlife. Prior to receiving any funds, each county 10 predator management board shall submit a budget and a plan 11 of work to the Wyoming animal damage management board. Upon receiving funds, each county predator management board 12 13 shall submit a report to the Wyoming animal damage 14 management board, identifying the actions taken, 15 accomplishments and the monies expended, by July 1 of each 16 year;

(iii) The Wyoming department of agriculture shall submit to the joint agriculture, public lands and water resources interim committee by October 1, 2006, a report identifying the actions taken, the accomplishments and the monies expended by each county predator management board and the Wyoming animal damage management board
