1 AN ACT relating to school finance; establishing school 2 district financial assistance for specified purposes outside of and in addition to the education resource block 3 grant school finance funding model; modifying the career-4 vocational education grant program as specified 5 and 6 establishing a statewide career-technical education steering committee; funding school district distance 7 education programs and eliminating distance 8 learning 9 incentive payments; imposing duties and reporting requirements upon the department of education; granting 10 rulemaking authority; imposing school district reporting 11 requirements; providing appropriations; authorizing 12 positions; and providing for effective dates. 13

17 [SECTION 1. SUMMER SCHOOL/EXTENDED DAY]

Supplemental financial assistance program 15 for instructional facilitators and instructional coaches. 16 17 (a) The supplemental financial assistance program for 18 instructional facilitators and instructional coaches 19 is established to augment resources within the education 20 21 resource block grant model available to districts for 22 professional development. Supplemental assistance under this section shall be for school-based instructional 23 facilitators and instructional coaches to assist schools 24

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with providing ongoing instructional coaching and
 instructional mentoring.

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(b) Each school district may apply to the department 4 5 of education for financial assistance under this section on or before April 15 of the school year immediately preceding 6 school year for which financial assistance 7 the is requested. Application shall be on a form and in a manner 8 9 prescribed by the department and application review and 10 selection shall be in accordance with the process 11 established by department rule and regulation. At minimum, application shall include documentation of 12 the the 13 following program components:

9 Financial assistance to each qualifying applicant (e) school district shall be made by the department from 10 11 amounts appropriated by the legislature to the foundation program account for purposes of the program established by 12 this section and shall be in addition to the foundation 13 14 program amount computed for that district under W.S. 21-13-309(p). If there is an insufficient amount within 15 the foundation program account from amounts appropriated by 16 17 the legislature for financial assistance under this section for any school year, the department shall make a pro rata 18 reduction in financial assistance payments 19 amonq all qualifying districts for that school year. Section 302. Five million eight hundred ninety-four thousand three hundred six dollars (\$5,894,306.00) is appropriated from the public school foundation program account to the department of education, to be expended only to augment amounts within the department's budget for the supplemental funding program for instructional facilitators and instructional coaches pursuant to W.S. 21-13-335, as

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1 created under Section 301 of this act. This appropriation shall be for the period beginning July 1, 2008, and ending 2 3 June 30, 2009. 4 5 [SECTION 4. AT-RISK STUDENTS] 6 Section 401. 7 8 9 (a) To continue study efforts assigned to the state superintendent of public instruction by 2006 10 Wyoming Session Laws, Chapter 37, Section 7(c), and 11 further directed under 2007 Wyoming Session Laws, Chapter 147, 12 13 Section 103, the state superintendent shall through the department of education establish a study committee to 14 continue the review, analysis and evaluation of at-risk 15 resources and strategies for refinement of block grant 16 17 model components supporting at-risk students. This effort in coordination and consultation with the 18 shall be allocation and use study effort initiated under 2006 19 Wyoming Session Laws, Chapter 37, Section 8, and continued 20 21 under Section 7 of this act.

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(b) The state superintendent's study committee shallbe appointed by the state superintendent from among

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representatives of school districts, community programs and 1 2 state governmental agencies which are engaged in and have a 3 designated responsibility for developing, implementing and 4 administering programs and services addressing the needs of 5 at-risk student populations. Study committee members shall be reimbursed only for per diem and travel 6 expenses incurred while attending official committee business, at 7 rates prescribed by law for members of the 8 Wyoming 9 legislature. The study committee shall expire on June 30, 2010, unless extended by the state superintendent 10 and 11 funded by legislative appropriation.

13 (C) Duties of the state superintendent's study commission shall at minimum include the evaluation of at-14 risk prevention and intervention programs and providing 15 quidance to the state superintendent on necessary program 16 17 and policy changes for effective and equitable at-risk program delivery. In undertaking these assigned duties, 18 the study committee shall: 19

(i) Develop an operational definition of atrisk, using definitions at local, state and federal program-levels as guidance in establishing definitional components;

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1 2 (ii) Following the evaluation of at-risk 3 including the identification of consistent and programs 4 reliable measures of program effectiveness and the 5 implementation of research-based strategy models, determine an equitable and effective standard for a continuum of 6 support services for school 7 learning districts in addressing at-risk student needs; 8 9 (iii) Evaluate the role of alternative schools 10 11 and programs and the expected student outcomes from this at-risk strategy, including the identification of entry and 12 13 exit criteria and program effectiveness indicators; 14 (iv) Identify different programs appropriately 15 provided through court ordered and institutionalized 16 17 placements and develop standardized individual learning plans for each identified program as appropriate; 18 19 20 (v) Within the ordered court and 21 institutionalized placement policy, establish school 22 district and institutional responsibilities tied to each placement as well as the responsibilities for the effective 23 transition of each placement. 24

2 Preliminary study recommendations (d) shall be 3 provided by the study committee to the state superintendent 4 in sufficient time for submission of an initial report to 5 the joint education interim committee on or before November 1, 2008. Final study committee recommendations shall be 6 completed and reported to the state superintendent by 7 October 1, 2009, and the state superintendent shall submit 8 9 a final report to the joint education interim committee on or before November 1, 2009.
