A BILL

for

- 1 AN ACT relating to minimum wages; increasing minimum wages
- 2 for all employees; and providing for an effective date.

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4 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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6 **Section 1.** W.S. 27-4-202 is amended to read:

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8 27-4-202. Minimum wage rates.

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- 10 (a) Every employer shall pay to each of his or her
- 11 employees wages at a rate of not less than five dollars and
- 12 <u>fifteen cents (\$5.15)</u> seven dollars and twenty-five cents
- 13 (\$7.25) per hour.

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- 15 (b) Effective April 1, 2001 July 1, 2009 and
- 16 thereafter, all employers who employ tipped employees shall

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1 not pay less than two dollars and thirteen cents (\$2.13) 2 five dollars (\$5.00) per hour to his tipped employees. 3 Provided further, if the wage paid by the employer combined 4 with the tips received by the employee during a given pay 5 period does not equal at least the applicable minimum wage as prescribed in subsection (a) of this section, 6 employer shall pay the difference to the tipped employee. 7 For the purposes of this act, all "tip" employees shall 8 9 furnish monthly to their respective employers the daily 10 record of tips required to be kept by "tip" employees under 11 the laws of the United States and upon the forms prescribed by the internal revenue service of the United States 12 13 treasury department. The daily record of tips shall 14 constitute prima facie proof of the amount of tips received 15 by the employee. Proof of a customary tipping percentage of sales or service shall also be an admissible form of 16 17 proof of the amount of tips. A "tip" employee is one who 18 customarily and regularly receives more than thirty dollars 19 (\$30.00) a month in tips. 20 21 (c) In lieu of the rate prescribed in subsection (a) 22 of this section, any employer may pay any employee who has

24 not less than four dollars and twenty five cents (\$4.25)

not attained the age of twenty (20) years a wage which is

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1 six dollars and fifteen cents (\$6.15) per hour during the 2 first ninety (90) consecutive days after the employee is 3 initially employed by the employer. No employer may take 4 any action to displace employees, including partial 5 displacements such as reduction in hours, wages or 6 employment benefits for purposes of hiring individuals at 7 the wage authorized in this subsection. 8 9 Section 2. This act is effective July 1, 2009. 10
