Phase two study-I-80 tolling.

A BILL

for

1	AN ACT relating to highway funding; requiring a phase two
2	study of tolling on interstate 80; providing an
3	appropriation; and providing for an effective date.
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5	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:
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7	Section 1.
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9	(a) The Wyoming department of transportation shall
10	conduct, or contract with other persons to conduct, a study
11	of tolling on Wyoming's portion of interstate 80. The
12	study shall be a follow-up to the phase one tolling study
13	completed in the fall of 2008 and, in addition to other
14	pertinent issues, shall consider the following issues as

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1 they relate to the implementation of the tolling and 2 improvement scenarios listed below: 3 4 (i) Roadway safety enhancements only (current 5 estimated need is three hundred twenty million dollars (\$320,000,000.00));6 7 8 (ii) Constructing one (1) new lane, east-bound 9 and west-bound, to be shared by all vehicles; 10 11 (iii) Constructing one (1) new lane, east-bound 12 and west-bound, the lanes farthest from the center median 13 for trucks only, the center lanes for all vehicles and with 14 trucks restricted from the lanes nearest the center median. 15 16 (b) The following issues shall be reviewed: 17 (i) Refine the roadway concept. This task shall 18 19 provide a more detailed description of the roadway under 20 the specific improvement scenarios listed in paragraphs 21 (a)(i) through (iii) of this section. It shall entail a 22 review of the corridor, identify areas where the roadway footprint and associated costs could be reduced while 23 24 meeting the improvement objectives and where appropriate,

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1 shall utilize cost estimates from the Wyoming department of 2 transportation's engineering programs, including bridge, project development, right-of-way and utilities programs. 3 4 task shall identify and highlight This any safety 5 improvements that expansion may provide, identify safety enhancements from tolling operations including additional 6 7 enforcement, and provide patrols and information on developing a strategy to gain federal approval under 8 9 applicable federal programs that require applications;

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11 (ii) Refine the tolling concept. In conjunction with paragraph (a)(i) of this section, this task shall 12 13 analyze staging for tolling implementation to assess 14 options for potential precompletion tolling, which, in addition to financing, may provide early cash flow for 15 This task shall include a review of the 16 construction. 17 number and location of tolling points needed to maximize revenue while minimizing operations costs and inconvenience 18 19 to the public;

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(iii) Fiscal and other impacts analysis. This
task shall assess the impacts arising from tolling,
including how traffic diversion related to tolling may
affect local businesses and change regional and state

1 economic metrics. The impacts analysis shall include 2 analyses of state and federal fuel tax, sales tax and other 3 tax revenues as well as likely impacts to businesses 4 operating along the I-80 corridor. The review also shall 5 be conducted on the impact of toll diversion on annual 6 roadway maintenance outlays including the net effect to 7 wear and tear on I-80 due to reduced truck traffic;

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(iv) Federal funding impacts. This task shall 9 10 assess concerns over loss of interstate maintenance funding 11 and potential impacts to other federal highway funding allocations for each improvement scenario. This task shall 12 13 clearly document the issues and provide potential 14 strategies for minimizing the loss of any funding. This task shall provide information needed for discussions with 15 16 federal highway administration regarding federal the 17 tolling programs that could meet goals for I-80;

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(v) Define financing scenarios. In the wake of the recent financial market crisis, this task shall review all financing assumptions, including the ability and need of Wyoming to provide additional financial assurance for any debt, the availability of bond insurance and the likelihood that investment-grade ratings can be obtained.

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1 This task also shall consider the cost of the debt plus a 2 projection of operation costs to be used to derive a 3 "breakeven" toll schedule for each improvement scenario; 4

5 (vi) Public outreach. This task shall require 6 the department or persons retained by the department to 7 present tolling concepts, including information gathered pursuant to this act, to the public and to stakeholders 8 9 through outreach, education and focus groups. One (1) goal 10 of this task shall be to gather and understand the concerns 11 of all stakeholders and provide accurate information to stakeholders and the public so as to avoid reactions based 12 13 on insufficient or inaccurate information;

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15 (vii) Review of tolling technology. A basic
16 electronic toll collection/cash operation has been modeled
17 in phase one but other potential technology shall be
18 evaluated for use on I-80.

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20 Section 2. The phase two study required by section 1 21 of this act shall be completed on or before September 1, 22 2009 and a copy of the report shall be provided to the 23 joint transportation, highways and military affairs interim 24 committee on or before that date.

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2 Section 3. There is appropriated from the general 3 fund to the Wyoming department of transportation fifty 4 thousand dollars (\$50,000.00). The appropriation shall 5 only be expended for the purpose of completing and publishing the study and report required in section 1 of 6 7 this act. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, this appropriation shall not be transferred or expended for any 8 9 other purpose and any unexpended, unobligated funds 10 remaining from this appropriation shall revert as provided 11 by law on June 30, 2010. This appropriation shall not be included in the department's 2011-2012 standard biennial 12 13 budget request.

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15 Section 4. The Wyoming department of transportation 16 shall supplement the appropriation made in section 3 of 17 this act with federal highway planning funds as necessary 18 to fund the study and report required in section 1 of this 19 act.

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1	Section 5. This act is effective immediately upon
2	completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law
3	as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming
4	Constitution.
