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11 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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13 **Section 1.** W.S. 21-9-104 is created to read:

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- 15 21-9-104. Establishment of content and performance
- 16 standards by the state board.

The state of Wyoming shall retain sole control 2 (a) over the development, establishment and revision of the 3 content and performance standards established pursuant to 4 5 this section and W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iii). Neither the state board, nor any other state education entity, nor any state 6 official, may join any consortium or any other organization 7 when participation in that consortium or organization would 8 9 cede any measure of control over any aspect of Wyoming 10 public education to entities outside the state, nor may any 11 such person or entity condition or delay a decision on content and performance standards on the decision of any 12 13 consortium, organization or other state government, or the federal government. 14

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April 15, 2014, (b) Effective and each thereafter, the state board shall establish the content and performance standards advisory council to advise the state board in creating and adopting world class content and performance standards that will lead to a broad liberal arts education, resulting in college and career readiness for all students. Unless specifically provided otherwise by this subsection, members of the advisory council shall be 23

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1 appointed by the state board. The advisory council shall

2 consist of the following members:

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4 (i) One (1) curriculum director from a Wyoming

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5 Each subcommittee shall prepare proposed content and performance standards based on the review conducted 6 subsection (d) of this section, 7 including revisions deemed necessary by the subcommittee. 8 Each 9 subcommittee, through the department of education, shall provide an electronic copy of the proposed standards to 10 11 every Wyoming school district board of trustees and to the relevant department heads of each Wyoming institution of 12 higher education including at minimum, department heads of 13 the content areas addressed by those standards. 14 proposed standards shall be available to the public by 15 means of existing communication resources utilized by 16 17 school districts. Each subcommittee shall provide a public comment period on the proposed standards of not less than 18 sixty (60) days and shall hold at least five (5) public 19 hearings at various locations across the state to receive 20 21 comment on the rigor, clarity and reasonableness of the 22 standards developed by the subcommittee. Each subcommittee shall revise the standards as appropriate based upon public 23 participation and comment. Each subcommittee shall prepare 24

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1 a report to the advisory council on the proposed standards

2 for its review and approval.

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4 (f) Upon receipt of a report on proposed content and

6 council shall review and finalize the standards before

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10 (g) Prior to promulgation of rules and regulations

11 under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iii), the state board shall conduct

12 at least one (1) public hearing in every legislative

1 standards advisory council or of any subcommittee established under this section shall be a resident of 2 Wyoming for at least eight (8) months and at minimum, hold 3 a bachelor's degree or equivalent four (4) year degree from 4 5 an accredited higher education institution. The members of the advisory council and of any subcommittee shall be as 6 fairly balanced in geographic representation as reasonably 7 possible, with members from each of the legislative 8 9 districts representing urban and rural areas. Members shall 10 serve for no longer than four (4) years. Each member rotating off of the advisory council or of any subcommittee 11 shall be replaced within thirty (30) days. 12

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Each subject area of the content and performance 14 standards shall be reviewed pursuant to this section once 15 every eight (8) years. Reviews shall be staggered, with 16 17 only one (1) subject area review being initiated in any given year. Notwithstanding this subsection, the content 18 and performance standards for English language arts shall 19 20 be reviewed not later than December 31, 2014 and then again 21 not more than eight (8) years thereafter, and the content and performance standards for math shall be reviewed not 22 later than December 31, 2014, and then again not more than 23 24 six (6) years thereafter.

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2 In addition to the requirements contained in this (m) 3 section, content and performance standards that are not 4 developed under the sole authority of the state of Wyoming 5 or standards that use the same model framework developed primarily by entities other than the state of Wyoming shall 6 not be adopted or implemented by the state board until 7 expiration of a public comment period of at least one (1) 8 9 year.
