- 1 AN ACT relating to elections; authorizing the use of
- 2 electronic pollbooks; authorizing the use of vote centers;
- 3 providing definitions; making conforming amendments;
- 4 repealing certification of poll books by election judges;

1 (xlviii) "Polling place" means the physical 2 location where voters cast their ballots on election day; 3 (xlix) "Vote center" means a polling place at 4 5 which any registered elector in the political subdivision holding the election may vote, regardless of the precinct 6 in which he resides, connected through secure internet 7 connections to provide voting information to and receive 8 9 voting information from the computerized registration book maintained by the county clerk and used as an option to 10 traditional polling places at the discretion of the county 11 12 clerk. 13 22-2-104. Election dates. 14 15 16 A general election shall be held in for all the 17 precincts of this state on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. 18 19 A primary election shall be held at the regular 20 21 polling places in for each precinct on the first Tuesday after the third Monday in August in general election years 22 the nomination of candidates 23 for for partisan

10 22-3-111. Preparation and contents of pollbooks.

11

The county clerk shall prepare the necessary 12 (a) pollbooks for each precinct for statewide and political 13 subdivision elections held on the same date. The precinct 14 pollbooks shall contain the poll lists., the oaths of 15 judges of election, certificate of ballots, and a tally 16 sheet if ballots are hand counted. On the cover of the 17 pollbook shall be printed the words "Pollbook", the 18 election and date of the election, the voting district and 19 precinct numbers. 20

22 22-3-112. Pollbook distribution; entering

23 information.

24

Before the polls open, the county clerk shall distribute 1 the precinct pollbooks to the judges of election in the 2 respective precincts polling places. The judges of election 3 4 shall enter in pollbooks all information required by law. 5 22-3-113. Disposition of pollbooks after polls close. 6 7 8 (a) After the polls are closed, and the judges of the 9 election shall make printed pollbooks are made to agree, 10 the judges of election in each precinct and shall return one (1) pollbook containing one (1) copy of each of the 11 poll lists to the county clerk., together with the election 12 returns, and retain one (1) copy of each poll list in their 13 possession. Judges of election may discard poll lists in 14 their possession two (2) years after the election to which 15 the poll lists pertain or in the event of litigation, at 16 the conclusion of the litigation, whichever date is later. 17 18 19 (b) When electronic pollbooks are used, they shall be returned to the county clerk. 20 21 22-6-104. Sample 22 ballots and voting machine

23 facsimiles; printing, distribution, posting.

24

1 The officer providing the official ballot shall also print sample ballots or voting machine labels which shall be 2 identical to the official ballot or voting 3 facsimile except that it shall contain the words "SAMPLE 4 5 BALLOT" in large clear letters and may be printed on paper of a different color than the official ballot or label. The 6 officer shall distribute copies of the sample ballot or 7 voting machine facsimile to each precinct polling place 8 9 prior to opening of the polls. The judges of election shall 10 post at least three (3) copies of the sample in and around 11 the polling place during the election. The county clerk shall have the samples available in his office for the 12

15 22-6-106. Replacement of lost ballots or labels.

16

17 Official ballots or ballot labels not delivered to a precinct polling place or lost, stolen or destroyed shall 18 be replaced immediately by the official providing the 19 20 ballot. Judges of election receiving replacement ballots 21 shall sign a receipt therefor in which they shall state under oath, before each other, that the original ballots 22 were not delivered to the precinct polling place or have 23 24 been lost, stolen or destroyed.

2 22-6-122. Rotation of candidates' names; equal lines
3 on voting machines.

4

- 5 The names of candidates for each office shall be rotated on
- 6 all ballots by precinct for all elections. In each county
- 7 the name of each candidate shall appear substantially an
- 8 equal number of times at the top, at the bottom, and in
- 9 each intermediate place. In a voting machine precinct
- 10 polling place, if candidates for the same office occupy
- 11 more than one (1) line on the voting machine, the number of
- 12 names appearing on each line shall be as nearly equal as
- 13 possible.

14

15 22-8-106. Number of judges in each polling place.

16

- 17 At least three (3) judges shall be appointed for each
- 18 precinct polling place. Additional judges may be appointed
- 19 in a precinct polling place as determined necessary by the
- 20 county clerk.

21

22 22-8-108. Appointment, composition and authority of

23 counting boards; when judges to count.

24

(a) The county clerk shall appoint a counting board 1 for each paper ballot precinct polling place casting more 2 3 than three hundred (300) votes at the last election, and may appoint a counting board in such a 4 5 precinct polling place in which one hundred fifty (150) or more such votes were cast at such election. A counting 6 board shall have three (3) members or more to facilitate 7 the counting of votes. No more than one (1) person under 8 9 the age of eighteen (18) may be appointed as to each counting board. 10

12 (c) The counting board in a paper ballot precinct

13 polling place has no authority to act until polls are

14 declared closed. A counting board in an electronic voting

15 system counting center may commence preparing absentee

16 ballots for counting at any time on the day of the

17 election.

18

19 (d) For a precinct polling place where a counting
20 board need not be appointed, the judges of election shall
21 count the votes.

23 22-9-115. Receipt by clerk; handling procedure.

24

1 The clerk shall place completed absentee ballot envelopes in a large precinct envelope for the precinct in 2 3 which they shall be voted and keep custody of them until they are delivered to the precinct polling place or the 4 5 designated counting center. The clerk shall endorse on the precinct envelope the number of the district and precinct 6 and the words "Envelope contains ballots of absentee 7 qualified electors and shall be opened only on election day 8 9 at the polls when the polls are open" and shall affix his

12 22-10-111. Delivery and return; expenses.

signature, official title, and seal the envelope.

13

The county clerk shall provide for the delivery of voting
machines to the precincts polling places at least one (1)
hour before the polls open and their return to custody
after the election. The expense of transporting the
machines shall be paid by the authority or proportionately
by the authorities conducting the election.

21 22-11-102. Use authorized; purchase or lease.

22

23 The board of county commissioners of each county may adopt

24 for use, either experimentally or permanently, in any

election in any or all precincts polling places within the 1 2 county, any electronic voting system authorized by law. 3 4 22-11-104. Conduct of elections in which systems 5 utilized. 6 (b) The county clerk of each county using 7 an electronic voting system shall: 8 9 10 (i) Determine whether paper ballots, ballot cards or a combination of both will be used in each 11 precinct polling place; 12 13 (ii) Before the day of election deliver to each 14 precinct polling place using an electronic voting system: 15 16 In addition to any other duties prescribed by 17 law, election judges in precincts polling places using an 18 electronic voting system shall: 19 20 21 22-12-107. Materials for judges. 22

1 (a) Before election day the county clerk shall cause to be delivered to one (1) of the judges of election in 2 3 each precinct polling place the following materials: 4 5 22-12-110. Supplies for voting machines. 6 (a) When voting machines are used the county clerk 7 shall have an appropriate official deliver to a judge of 8 9 election in each precinct polling place, before the day of election, the following supplies: 10

12 22-13-118. Judges work schedule.

13

At the discretion of the county clerk, election judges may 14 15 be allowed to work at the polling premise place on election day for a period of time less than the total amount of time 16 17 the polls are open provided the polling station place has a sufficient number of election judges on duty at all times 18 to comply with the requirements of this title. An election 19 judge shall not leave his polling station place during his 20 21 work shift.

22

23 22-14-102. Who may be present after polls close; 24 making pollbooks agree; counting votes.

After all the votes are cast and the polls are officially 2 3 declared closed, only election judges shall be permitted in a polling place. When all ballots are cast, the machine 4 5 shall be locked against further voting and sealed as prescribed by law. Pollbooks within a precinct shall first 6 be made to agree before any votes are counted. When the 7 pollbooks agree, Election judges shall commence to count 8 9 votes and shall continue without adjournment until counting

is completed.

22-14-105. Vote tallying in voting machine polling places.

14

15 (a) In voting machine precincts polling places, the judges of election shall cast all remaining absentee 16 17 ballots on a voting machine in the manner prescribed by W.S. 22-9-121 and shall lock and seal the voting machines. 18 They shall certify in writing that the machine was locked 19 20 and sealed, stating the time, the number of voters voting 21 on each machine in the precinct as shown on the public 22 counters, the number on the seal, and the number registered on the protective counter. 23

1	(b) Election judges shall then determine the number
2	of votes cast on each voting machine used in the precinct
3	polling place by opening the machine or obtaining a
4	photographic or mechanical printed return sheet from the
5	machine.

7	(d) In machine precincts polling places , write-in
8	votes shall be counted and the results tallied by the
9	election judges or counting board after the regular ballots
10	are counted.
11	
12	22-14-111. Returning records and returns to clerk.
13	
14	(a) As soon as possible after the tabulation of votes
15	is complete, election judges shall return by messenger to
16	the clerk who prepared the ballots for the election the
17	following records and returns in a sealed packet:

19	(i) One (1) copy of the sealed pollbook with one
20	(1)—sealed copy from each electronic voting system printer
21	pack;

23	(viii) Oaths of judges of election;

1	(ix) Reconciliation of ballots;

3	(x) Tally sheet if ballots are hand counted.

5	22-15-109. Poll watchers; certification;
6	qualification; authority; removal.
7	
8	(a) The county chairman of each political party may
9	certify poll watchers prior to the day of the election to
LO	serve in each precinct polling place. Not more than one
L1	(1) poll watcher from each political party may serve
L2	simultaneously unless the chief judge determines that one
L3	(1) additional poll watcher from each political party may
L4	be accommodated in the polling premises place without
L5	disrupting the polling process.
L6	
L7	(b) A poll watcher shall belong to the political
L8	party he represents and shall be a registered elector
L9	residing in the county. A poll watcher shall serve only at
20	the precinct polling place designated on the certificate.
21	A poll watcher is authorized to observe voter turn out and
22	registration and may make written memoranda but shall not
23	challenge voters, conduct electioneering activities or

disrupt the polling process.

(c) The chief judge may remove a poll watcher from 2 the polling premises place for disturbing the polling 3 4 place, or for any other violation of the Election Code. 5 22-16-102. Abstract of vote; returns not filed. 6 7 (a) The county clerk shall prepare an abstract of the 8 9 vote of all precincts in the county following a county 10 primary, special or general election. 19	(c) Precincts may be consolidated for the purpose of
20	any special election held under this section at the
21	discretion of the county clerk. Three (3) judges shall be
22	appointed for the polling place in each precinct in such
23	special elections, and additional judges may be appointed
24	if deemed necessary by the county clerk.

2 22-22-102. Date of election of trustees; terms;

5 (a) The election of members of the board of trustees

7 shall be held at the regular polling places in for each

10 run for four (4) years beginning at 12:00 noon on the first

15 (a) Except as provided in W.S. 22-23-202 municipal
16 primary and general elections are held at the same time, in
17 the same manner, at the same polling places, and are
18 conducted by the same precinct election officials, using
19 the same poll lists, as the statewide primary and general
20 elections.

22 **22-23-804. Ballots.**

23

1	The	municipal	clerk	shall	provide	ballots	for	the	special

- 2 election and shall deliver to each precinct polling place
- 3 ballots equal in number to the number of electors
- 4 registered in the precinct plus twenty-five percent (25%).

6 **22-23-805.** Poll lists.

7

- 8 Precinct poll lists for the special election shall be
- 9 obtained by the municipal clerk from the county clerk and
- 10 shall be paid for by the municipality. The municipal clerk
- 11 shall furnish copies of the precinct poll lists to the
- 12 judges of election. A copy of the precinct registry list
- 13 shall be posted at each precinct polling place during the
- 14 special election.
