1 AN ACT relating to education accountability; conforming law 2 as specified to Powers v. State, 2014 WY 15, 318 P.3d 300 and Powers v. State, No. 180-673 (1st Jud. Dist. Ct. Apr. 3 18, 2014); specifying implementation and development of 4 5 education accountability addressing teacher and school 6 leader evaluation; providing for phase I school 7 accountability implementation and refinement; providing for alternative school accountability; prescribing oversight 8 9 and use of district assessment systems in state 10 accountability; modifying state criteria for high school graduation; providing for continuation of 11 select 12 accountability and advisory committees; providing for technical advisory group; imposing reporting requirements; 13 providing appropriations; and providing for an effective 14 15 date.

1 2 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 3 4 Section 1. W.S. 21-2-202(a)(xxx) and by creating a new paragraph (xxxvi), 21-2-204(f)(vi) and (vii) and 5 21-3-110(a)(xxix), as amended by 15LSO-0001 conforming 6 Wyoming Statute to Powers v. State, 2014 WY 15, 318 P.3d 7 300 and Powers v. State, No. 180-673 (1^{st} Jud. Dist. Ct. 8 9 Apr. 18, 2014), are amended to read: 10 11 21-2-202. Duties of the state superintendent. 12 13 (a) In addition to any other duties assigned by law, 14 the state superintendent shall: 15 16 (xxx) Effective school year 2012-2013 and each school year thereafter, in consultation and coordination 17 18 with local school districts, by rule and regulation 19 establish a program of administering a standardized, 20 curriculum based, achievement college entrance examination, 21 computer-adaptive college placement assessment and a job skills assessment test selected by the state superintendent 22 23 to all students in the eleventh and twelfth grades

throughout the state in accordance with this paragraph. The 1 2 examinations and tests selected by the state superintendent 3 shall be administered throughout the United States and 4 shall be relied upon by institutions of higher education. The college entrance examination shall at a minimum test in 5 the areas of English, reading, writing, mathematics and 6 science for all students in grade eleven (11). The jobs 7 8 skills assessment test shall be optional for all students in grade eleven (11) twelve (12) and shall at a minimum 9 test in the areas of applied math, reading for information 10 and locating information. The state superintendent shall 11 12 pay all costs associated with administering the college 13 entrance examination, the computer-adaptive college 14 placement assessment and the jobs skills assessment test and shall schedule a day during which examinations shall be 15 16 provided. The date for statewide administration of the college entrance examination in grade eleven (11) shall be 17 18 selected so that following receipt of scores, students may 19 timely register for senior year classes which may be 20 necessary to allow the student to qualify for a state 21 -scholarship -established by the provided 22 superintendent in a manner that best meets the needs of 23 students and school districts. The computer adaptive

college placement assessment shall be optional and all 1 2 students in grade twelve (12) shall be provided at least 3 one (1) opportunity to take the assessment during the 4 school year. The state superintendent may enter into agreements with an administrator of the college entrance 5 examination and the computer-adaptive college placement 6 administrator of the 7 assessment and an jobs skills 8 assessment test and adopt rules as necessary to ensure 9 compliance with any requirements of an administrator, such 10 as a secure environment. Waivers may be granted for the 11 examinations and tests required by this paragraph 12 students with disabilities in accordance with provisions of the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 13 and the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education 14 Act. Alternate assessments and accommodations shall be 15 16 offered by the state superintendent in accordance with rule 17 and regulation;

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(xxxvi) Commencing school year 2015-2016, in conjunction with the school district accreditation process required under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(ii) and as a component of the statewide education accountability system created under W.S. 21-2-204, conduct a review of each school district

21 support, intervention and consequence. Commencing with

1 state superintendent shall take action based upon system

4 (vi) Schools designated as not meeting expectations shall file an improvement plan in accordance 5 with paragraph (iv) of this subsection that identifies and 6 addresses all content and indicator areas where performance 7 is below target levels. In addition, the evaluation of a 8 9 district's student assessment system as provided by 10 paragraph (vii) of this subsection shall be undertaken in 11 that school year immediately following any school year in 12 which a school within the district has been designated as 13 not meeting expectations. The state superintendent shall 14 appoint a representative from the department in accordance 15 with paragraph (vii) of this subsection to assist in 16 drafting the improvement plan, including the selection of programs and interventions to improve student performance. 17 18 The representative shall perform duties as required by paragraph (v) of this subsection. The plan shall be 19 20 recommended by the school district superintendent and 21 approved by the local board of trustees prior to submission to the department. The plan shall describe the personnel 22 and financial resources within the education resource block 23

5 Failure to meet improvement goals as specified in the plan

6 for two (2) consecutive years may be grounds for dismissal

9 (vii) A representative shall be appointed by the 10 state superintendent for all schools designated under 11 paragraphs (iv) through (vi) of this subsection to serve as 12 a liaison between the school district leadership and the 13 department. The representative shall be an employee of the department, an employee of a Wyoming school district or any 14 15 combination, and may require more than one (1) individual 16 for schools requiring substantial intervention and support. 17 Additionally, one (1) representative may be assigned to 18 more than one (1) school. Among other duties as may be 19 requested by the district or department, the representative 20 shall review and approve improvement plans submitted by 21 schools in accordance with paragraphs (iv) through (vi) of this subsection, and may review and evaluate district 22 23 student assessment systems implemented under W.S.
