State health and social welfare institutions.

Sponsored by: Select Committee on Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services

#### A BILL

#### for

1 AN ACT relating to the administration of government; 2 providing for a study of the state's health and social 3 welfare institutions; creating a select legislative committee on state institutions; creating a governor's 4 5 planning committee on state institutions; prescribing 6 duties of the committees; requiring reports; authorizing 7 temporary positions; providing appropriations; providing 8 for a delayed repeal date; and providing for an effective 9 date. 10

11 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 12

13 Section 1.

There is created the select committee on state 2 (a) institutions consisting of the following members: 3 4 5 (i) Four (4) members of the Wyoming senate 6 appointed by the president of the senate and six (6) 7 members of the Wyoming house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, subject to 8 9 the following: 10 11 The president and the speaker shall (A) 12 coordinate their appointments to include in the membership 13 of the select committee, to the extent feasible, current or 14 former members of the joint appropriations committee, the joint judiciary interim committee, the joint labor, health 15 16 and social services interim committee, the select committee to study developmental programs and the select committee on 17 18 mental health and substance abuse services; 19 20 (B) The president and the speaker shall 21 each designate a cochairman unless they jointly designate a 22 chairman. 23

1 (b) The select committee shall have the power to 2 introduce legislation, to make recommendations to the 3 governor and the legislature and to make the reports 4 required by this act and any related reports deemed useful 5 by the committee.

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7 (c) There is created a governor's planning committee 8 on state institutions consisting of the following members: 9

10 (i) The directors of the departments of health11 and family services;

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(ii) Three (3) persons appointed by the governor who may be either state employees or private citizens and who shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. Private citizen appointees shall be compensated for their service on the committee in the same amount as legislators;

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(iii) A chairman designated by the governor from
among the persons appointed pursuant to paragraphs (i) and
(ii) of this subsection.

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1 (d) governor's planning committee The on state 2 institutions shall have the power to make recommendations 3 to the governor and the legislature and, with the consent governor, to recommend legislation to the 4 of the 5 legislature. The planning committee may submit а 6 concurrence, dissent or supplement to the reports made by 7 the select committee on state institutions and may make such additional relevant reports as the planning committee 8 9 deems appropriate, including advice to the governor on 10 personnel issues at the institutions.

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The select committee on state institutions and 12 (e) 13 governor's planning committee on state institutions shall 14 ordinarily meet jointly, but each committee shall have the 15 power to meet separately. When meeting jointly, the 16 committees shall be known joint legislativeas the executive committee on state 17 institutions, with the 18 appointed chairmen serving as cochairmen.

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20 (f) The joint legislative-executive committee on 21 state institutions shall have the power to consider and 22 make recommendations to the governor on staffing levels and 23 utilization in the state institutions.

### 2 Section 2.

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4 (a) The joint legislative-executive committee on 5 state institutions shall conduct a study of the facilities 6 and functions of the Wyoming state hospital, the Wyoming 7 state training school, the Wyoming pioneer home, the 8 Wyoming retirement center, the Wyoming boys' school, the 9 Wyoming girls' school and the veterans' home of Wyoming, 10 subject to the following:

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12 (i) The committee shall develop a long term 13 strategy for serving institutional needs of populations 14 covered by the study, including consideration of the capacity and ability of existing and future private 15 16 facilities to serve the institutional needs of populations covered by the study, privatization of services, provision 17 18 of services in home or community based settings and 19 provision of services in a state institution;

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(ii) The committee shall develop a long term strategy for the utilization of the institutions' physical facilities;

2 (iii) The committee shall develop a long term capital plan to ensure the institutions are capable of 3 implementing the recommended strategy. The capital plan 4 5 shall provide for the retention, renovation as necessary 6 and new construction of facilities needed to implement the 7 recommended strategy. The capital plan shall also provide for the sale, demolition, decommissioning or conversion to 8 other uses of the institutions' physical facilities not 9 10 needed to implement the recommended strategies; 11 12 (iv) W.S. 9-5-107 and 9-5-108 shall not apply to the study authorized by this act nor to any recommendations 13 made pursuant to this act by the joint 14 legislativeexecutive committee on state institutions. 15 16 The study shall include the following components: 17 (b) 18 Identification of special populations for 19 (i) 20 which the state has a responsibility and for whom institutional care may be appropriate for at least some of 21 22 the population some of the time, including but not limited 23 to:

1 2 (A) Persons with severe and persistent 3 mental illness who are adults, children, adolescents or persons needing nursing home care due to 4 aging or 5 progressive degenerative illness; 6 7 (B) Persons found not guilty of a crime due to mental illness or deficiency without responsibility and 8 9 subject to disposition pursuant to W.S. 7-11-306(c) or (d); 10 11 (C) Persons, including persons accused of a 12 crime, who are temporarily placed in the custody of the 13 state for purposes of a psychiatric examination; 14 15 Persons with (D) a developmental 16 disability, including children or adults with a severe disability, adults whose family care givers are no longer 17 18 available to care for the person with a disability and geriatric persons with a disability who need assisted 19 20 living or nursing home services; 21 22 (E) Children adjudicated delinquent or in 23 need of supervision;

1 2 Persons who are incarcerated felons and (F) 3 in need of nursing home care; 4 5 (G) Persons with acquired brain injuries; 6 7 (H) Persons eligible for placement in the Wyoming pioneer home; 8 9 10 (J) Veterans eligible for placement in the 11 veterans' home of Wyoming or a nursing home; 12 (K) Persons who are in need of nursing home 13 14 care but who have conditions such that private nursing 15 homes are unable or unwilling to care for them; 16 17 Persons with Alzheimer's disease or (M) 18 functionally similar senile dementia; 19 20 (N) Persons with a long term contagious 21 needing special isolation and quarantine disease and facilities not available in hospitals; 22 23

1 (0) Other special populations the joint 2 committee may identify, not including those persons in need 3 of general health care or incarcerated persons who are not 4 otherwise described in this paragraph.

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6 (ii) For each special population identified in 7 paragraph (i) of this subsection, the joint committee shall identify the degree to which institutional placement is 8 9 needed, the projected size of the population in need of 10 institutional placement, the special characteristics of the 11 institution needed to serve the population, necessary or 12 recommended limitations on commingling with other populations and a summary of current services to the 13 14 population, including the capacity and ability of existing private facilities to serve the institutional needs of 15 populations covered by the study; 16

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18 (iii) A physical inventory of the facilities19 available at the institutions, including:

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21 (A) The current uses of each facility;22

1 Currently known information about the (B) 2 physical condition of each facility and known defects or 3 problems; 4 5 Special features which make a facility (C) 6 useful for a particular population; 7 8 Known limitations on the facility which (D) 9 render it inappropriate for use by a particular population. 10 11 (iv) A compilation and summary of recent studies 12 conducted by the state on the institutions and services to 13 the special populations identified in the study; 14 15 (v) A recommended strategy for serving the 16 special populations identified with emphasis on the more 17 acutely affected populations for whom institutional care is 18 appropriate, including a strategy for the most appropriate use of the inventoried facilities. In developing the 19 strategy, consideration shall be given to: 20

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Privatization or continuation of the 1 (A) 2 private delivery of services for the populations 3 identified; 4 5 (B) Home or community placement in public, private for profit or private nonprofit facilities; 6 7 8 (C) historical The and expected 9 difficulties in obtaining adequate professional and paraprofessional staff in some communities; 10 11 12 cost effectiveness (D) The of various 13 strategies and the cost to the state of various 14 institutional strategies; 15 16 (E) The possible capital cost to the state of various strategies for use of institutional facilities; 17 18 19 The availability of (F) family and community support services and the overall quality of life 20 21 for members of the identified populations under various 22 service options; 23

(G) The safety of members of the identified 1 2 populations under various service options; 3 4 (H) Other factors which the joint committee 5 deems relevant. 6 7 (C) In conducting the study required by this act, the joint committee shall: 8 9 (i) Before July 31, 2011, visit each of the 10 11 institutions identified in subsection 2(a) of this act, 12 conduct a public hearing at each institution and conduct at least two (2) other public hearings in other locations 13 14 within the state; 15 (ii) Notwithstanding subsection 1(d) of this 16 act, make a preliminary report to the governor and the 17 legislature by November 30, 2010 on the joint committee's 18 19 activities with recommendations for immediate legislation, 20 if any; 21

(iii) Make a final report to the governor and
 the legislature by August 1, 2011 concerning paragraphs
 (b)(i), (iii) and (iv) of this section;

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5 (iv) Make a preliminary report by November 1, 6 2011 on the overall strategy for serving the identified 7 populations;

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9 (v) Make a report to the governor and the joint 10 appropriations committee by November 1, 2011 to include any 11 recommendations for appropriations in the 2012-2013 12 biennial budget for facility construction and remodeling 13 studies to meet the recommended service strategies. The 14 report shall also include recommendations for the sale, demolition, decommissioning or conversion of facilities not 15 16 needed to meet the recommended service strategies.

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(d) The select committee on state institutions shall sponsor legislation making any statutory changes in the missions of the institutions it determines is needed to implement preliminary strategies identified by the joint legislative-executive committee on state institutions.

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Notwithstanding W.S. 9-5-107 and 9-5-108, the 1 (e) 2 select committee on state institutions by December 1, 2012 shall recommend a final strategy for the state institutions 3 and, if possible, a timetable for capital construction to 4 5 meet identified needs. The select committee shall have the 6 power to sponsor legislation in the 2013 general session 7 even if the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives abolish the select committee by 8 9 failing to appoint or reappoint members to the select 10 committee from the legislature commencing in January, 2013. 11

(f) The select committee on state institutions shall expire with the end of the term of the 61<sup>st</sup> Wyoming legislature, unless the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives extend the term of the committee until March 31, 2014 by appointing members to the committee during or within thirty (30) days of the end of the 2013 general session.

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20 (g) The governor's planning committee on state 21 institutions shall expire on January 11, 2013 unless the 22 select committee on state institutions is extended and the 23 governor chooses to appoint members to the planning

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committee, in which case the planning committee shall 1 2 expire on March 31, 2014. 3 4 Section 3. 5 The legislative service office is authorized 6 (a) 7 three (3) additional full-time temporary positions for the purposes of this act. The positions shall expire June 30, 8 9 The positions shall include a project director and 2014. 10 two (2) assistants. The project director shall serve as 11 executive secretary for both the select committee on state 12 institutions and the governor's planning committee on state 13 institutions, except that the governor may designate a 14 separate executive secretary for the governor's planning 15 committee. 16 may temporarily assign other 17 (b) The governor 18 executive branch employees to assist in the work of the

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22 Section 4.

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joint legislative-executive committee on state institutions

There is appropriated six hundred fifty thousand 1 (a) 2 dollars (\$650,000.00) from the general fund to the 3 legislative service office. This appropriation shall be for the period beginning with the effective date of this 4 5 act and ending June 30, 2014. This appropriation shall only be expended for the purpose of the operations of the 6 7 select committee on state institutions. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, this appropriation shall not be 8 9 transferred or expended for any other purpose and any 10 unexpended, unobligated funds remaining from this 11 appropriation shall revert as provided by law on July 1, 12 This appropriation shall not be included in the 2014. 13 legislative service office's 2013-2014 biennial budget 14 request.

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16 is appropriated five hundred thousand (b) There 17 dollars (\$500,000.00) from the general fund to the legislative service office. This appropriation shall be 18 for the period beginning with the effective date of this 19 act and ending June 30, 2014. This appropriation shall 20 21 only be expended for the purpose of hiring consultants to assist in the study required by this act. The legislative 22 23 service office may transfer funds as needed between the

appropriations in subsections (a) and (b) of this section. 1 2 Notwithstanding any other provision of law and except as 3 provided in the preceding sentence, this appropriation shall not be transferred or expended for any other purpose 4 5 and any unexpended, unobligated funds remaining from this appropriation shall revert as provided by law on July 1, 6 7 2014. This appropriation shall not be included in the legislative service office's 2013-2014 biennial budget 8 9 request.

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11 There is appropriated forty-five thousand dollars (C) (\$45,000.00) from the general fund to the governor's 12 13 office. This appropriation shall be for the period 14 beginning with the effective date of this act and ending 15 June 30, 2014. This appropriation shall only be expended the operations of the governor's 16 for the purpose of planning committee on state institutions. Notwithstanding 17 18 any other provision of law, this appropriation shall not be 19 transferred or expended for any other purpose and any 20 unexpended, unobligated funds remaining from this 21 appropriation shall revert as provided by law on July 1, This appropriation shall not be included in the 22 2014. 23 governor's 2013-2014 standard biennial budget request.

1 2 Section 5. This act is repealed effective June 30, 3 2014. 4 Section 6. This act is effective immediately upon 5 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law 6 as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming 7 8 Constitution. 9 10 (END)
