A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to public schools; imposing criteria on the adoption of state education program and student content and 2 performance standards; requiring adherence to process and 3 quidelines; prohibiting the enforcement of specified rules 4 5 and regulations of the Wyoming department of education; prohibiting participation in standards and assessment 6 activities originating out-of-state by state board members, 7 official and other agencies representing public schools; 8 prohibiting sharing of educational data; requiring the 9 legislative service office to make conforming amendments; 10 and providing for an effective date. 11

13 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

Section 1. W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iii)(intro) and (c) is 15

by rule and regulation and in consultation and coordination 7 with local school districts, prescribe uniform student 8 9 content and performance standards for the common core of knowledge and the common core of skills specified under 10 W.S. 21-9-101(b), and promulgate uniform standards for 11 special needs of 12 programs addressing the student populations specified under W.S. 21-9-101(c) that ensure 13 14 these student populations are provided the opportunity to learn the common core knowledge and skills as prescribed by 15 the uniform student content and performance standards 16 17 pursuant to this paragraph. Student content and performance standards prescribed under this paragraph shall include 18 standards for graduation from any high school within any 19 school district of this state and shall describe required 20 21 performance levels in order to achieve proficiency of the 22 common core of knowledge and common core of skills prescribed under W.S. 21-9-101(b). The ability to prescribe 23 24 content and performance standards shall not be construed to

1 give the state board of education the authority to

2 prescribe textbooks or curriculum which the state board is

3 hereby forbidden to do. Graduation standards imposed under

4 this paragraph shall require the successful completion of

9 The state board shall perform an ongoing review (C) state board duties prescribed by law and may make 10 11 recommendations to the legislature on board Effective April 1, 2014, the educational program standards 12 13 imposed under W.S. 21-9-101 and 21-9-102 and, enforced 14 under paragraphs (a)(ii) and (b)(ii) of this section and the student content and performance standards adopted under 15 paragraph (a) (iii) of this section shall encompass academic 16 17 and cognitive instruction only, shall not in any way include attitudes, beliefs or value systems not essential 18 19 to the legal, economic and social structure of society and to the personal and social responsibility of citizens of 20 21 this state, and shall not reflect initiatives, directives 22 or other standards developed through state consortiums, nationally organized initiatives or by any other process 23

1 requirements of this subsection. Adoption of "common core state standards", as defined in this subsection, by the 2 state board pursuant to paragraph (a)(iii) of this section 3 is prohibited. As used in this subsection, "common core 4 5 state standards" means any standards promulgated by or based on the Common Core State Standard Initiatives, 6 7 including but not limited to Common Core State Standards aligned standards and materials; or directives by the 8 9 Smarter Assessment Consortium; or the Next Generation Science Standards; or any other standards written by and/or 10 copyrighted by the National Governors Association, Council 11 of Chief State School Officers, Achieve, Inc., or any other 12 13 testing consortium not originating in Wyoming. In addition 14 and not less than once every five (5) years, the board shall evaluate and review the uniformity and quality of the 15 educational program standards imposed under W.S. 21 9 101 16 17 and 21-9-102 and the student content and performance standards promulgated under paragraph (a) (iii) of this 18 section through a deliberative process involving public 19 hearings and public input, ensuring the standards originate 20 21 in Wyoming and reflect the requirements of this subsection, 22 and shall report findings and recommendations to the joint education interim committee of the legislature on or before 23 24 December 1 of the year in which the review and evaluation

- 1 was undertaken. The joint education interim committee shall
- 2 report its recommendations, based upon findings and
- 3 recommendations of the state board, to the legislature
- 4 during the immediately following legislative session.

- 12 (a) Section 7(a)(i)(A) and (ii)(A), Chapter 10, rules
- 13 and regulations of the Wyoming department of education,
- 14 prescribing Wyoming language arts and mathematics content
- 15 and performance standards, filed with the secretary of
- 16 state on November 6, 2013, shall not be enforced on and
- 17 after April 1, 2014. Such standards are contrary to W.S.
- 18 21-13-304(a)(iii) and (c), as amended under section 1 of
- 19 this act, and are common core state standards.

- 21 (b) The secretary of state is directed to make
- 22 appropriate entries on the rules of the Wyoming department
- 23 of education on file with the official registry of

4 Section 4. Effective April 1, 2014, and for purposes 5 of adhering to W.S. 21-2-304(c), as amended by section 1 of this act, no member of the state board of education nor any 6 other state official or agency, as a representative of 7 Wyoming public schools, shall participate in the national 8 9 initiative known as the "common core state standards" 10 developed by the council of chief state school officers and the national governors association, nor shall any such 11 member, official or agency representative participate in 12 13 Smarter Assessment Consortium or other assessment 14 consortium which is based upon testing student proficiency under the common core state standards as defined in W.S. 15 21-2-304(c) as amended in section 1 of this act. 16

Section 5. In accordance with section 3 of this act,
upon entry of a final order by the district court of
Laramie County, Wyoming, without change of the final ruling
of the Wyoming Supreme Court issued January 28, 2014, in
the case of Kerry and Clara Powers, on behalf of themselves
and the citizens of Wyoming, and Cindy Hill, on behalf of
herself and as the Superintendent of Public Instruction v.

3 expiration of time for appeal of that order, or if appealed

4 upon issuance of a final order or mandate of the Wyoming

6 the legislative service office shall revise Wyoming

7 statutes as necessary to conform to the order as described

8 herein.
