for

AN ACT relating to economic diversification; creating a broadband development program; specifying requirements for providing funds for projects under the program; providing for administration by the Wyoming business council; requiring rules and specifying procedures; providing for

6 the establishment of a broadband advisory council;

7 providing for the position of broadband coordinator;

8 providing appropriations; restricting appropriations as

9 specified; and providing for an effective date.

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11 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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13 **Section 1.** W.S. 9-12-1501 through 9-12-1509 are

14 created to read:

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1 9-12-1501. Broadband development program established; purposes; eligibility; definitions. 2 3 4 (a) A broadband funding program is established under 5 the Wyoming business council to provide funds to eligible applicants in order to promote the expansion of access to 6 broadband service in unserved areas of the state. 7 8 9 Funds may be provided under this article for the 10 acquisition, deployment and installation of infrastructure 11 that supports broadband service at a minimum of at least 12 twenty-five (25) megabits per second download and three (3) megabits per second upload in residential areas and one (1) 13 14 gigabits per second download speed and one hundred (100) 15 megabits per second upload speed in business corridors. 16 17 (c) Except as provided in subsection (d) of this 18 section, eligible applicants for funding awarded under this 19 article are public private partnerships which include: 20 21 (i) A business entity authorized to be formed 22 under title 17 of the Wyoming statutes, or the laws of another state that are the functional equivalent, which is 23

1	authorized to transact business in this state and has
2	experience installing broadband infrastructure and
3	providing broadband services in rural areas; and
4	
5	(ii) A government entity specified in the
6	following:
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8	(A) A city, town or county or joint powers
9	board; or
10	
11	(B) A tribal government of either the
12	Northern Arapaho or Eastern Shoshone tribes of the Wind
13	River Indian Reservation.
14	
15	(d) A governmental entity specified in subparagraph
16	(c)(ii)(A) or (B) of this section shall develop a request
17	for proposals, as prescribed by the council, on such a form
18	as may be promulgated by the council, inviting business
19	entities to participate in a project proposed for funding
20	under this article. If no eligible business entity
21	responds to the request for proposal with a proposal
22	meeting the requirements specified, the governmental entity
23	may apply individually, or jointly with any other

governmental entity specified in subsection (c) of this 1 section. 2 3 4 (e) As used in this article, until established otherwise by rule of the Wyoming business council pursuant 5 to subsection (f) of this section, "unserved area" is an 6 area in which there exists no fixed terrestrial broadband 7 8 service, or in which the maximum fixed terrestrial 9 broadband speed available: 10 11 (i) To residential customers is ten (10)12 megabits per second download and one (1) megabit per second upload; 13 14 15 (ii) To a business corridor within a 16 municipality: 17 (A) With a population of less than two 18 19 thousand (2,000), is twenty-five (25) megabits per second 20 download and three (3) megabits per second upload;

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1 (B) With a population of two thousand 2 (2,000) or more, is fifty (50) megabits per second download 3 and five (5) megabits per second upload. 4 5 (iii) business corridor To а in an 6 unincorporated area of a county, is twenty-five (25) megabits per second download and three (3) megabits per 7 8 second upload. 9 Wyoming business council shall, by rule 10 (f) The 11 effective on July 1, 2020, modify the definition of 12 "unserved area" for purposes of this article. The rule shall only modify the definition by providing for upload 13 and download speeds exceeding those specified in subsection 14 (e) of this section as the business council determines 15 16 appropriate for technological conditions prevailing as of 17 July 1, 2020. 18 19 Wyoming business council shall (g) The 20 establish a definition of "business corridor" for purposes 21 of this article. An area shall not be considered a 22 business corridor unless multiple businesses are, or have

undertaken permitting, construction or other substantial

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- 1 steps to be, located in proximity to each other such that
- 2 the provision of broadband services at the speeds specified
- 3 in subsections (e) and (f) of this section is
- 4 technologically and economically feasible.

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- 8 (a) An eligible applicant shall submit an application
- 9 to the council on a form prescribed by the council. The
- 10 council shall develop administrative procedures governing
- 11 the application and funding process by September 1, 2018.
- 12 The council shall be responsible for receiving and
- 13 reviewing applications, entering into contracts and
- 14 authorizing the distribution of funds under this article,
- 15 subject to approval by the governor or his designee.

- 17 (b) The council shall provide for funding periods not
- 18 less frequently than biannually. At least thirty (30) days
- 19 prior to the first day of the funding period for which
- 20 applications may be submitted, the council shall publish on
- 21 its official website the specific criteria and any
- 22 quantitative weighting scheme or scoring system the council

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23 will use to evaluate or rank applications.

14	technologically feasible.

16	9-12-1503. Application contents.
17	
18	(a) An applicant for funding under this article shall
19	provide the following information on the application:
20	
21	(i) The location of the project;
22	

1 (ii) The kind and amount of broadband 2 infrastructure to be deployed for the project, including 3 initial speeds to be achieved and initial price of the 4 service to be provided; 5 6 (iii) Evidence regarding the unserved nature of the area where the project is to be located; 7 8 9 (iv) The number of households and businesses passed that will have access to broadband service as a 10 11 result of the project, or whose broadband service will be 12 upgraded as a result of the project; 13 14 (v) Significant community institutions and 15 industries that will benefit from the project; 16 17 (vi) Evidence of community support for the 18 project; 19 20 (vii) The total cost of the project, including a 21 business plan; 22

1	(viii) Sources of funding or in-kind
2	contributions for the project that will supplement any
3	funding under this article, including an examination of any
4	federal grants available to the project;
5	
6	(ix) Evidence that no later than six (6) weeks
7	before submission of the application the applicant
8	contacted, in writing, all entities providing broadband
9	service in the proposed project area to ask for each
10	broadband service provider's plan to upgrade broadband
11	service in the project area to speeds that meet or exceed
12	the speeds proposed in the application, within the time
13	frame specified in the proposed project activities;
14	
15	(x) The broadband service providers' written
16	responses, if any, to the inquiry made under paragraph (ix)
17	of this subsection;
18	
19	(xi) Acknowledgement by the governing body, and
20	any partnering business entity by a person with legal
21	authority to bind the business entity, that funding may
22	only be provided in accordance with a contract executed in

1 conformance with this article and is subject to

2 availability and approval of distribution of funds;

4 (xii) If the application is not submitted

5 jointly with a business entity, an account of the request

6 for proposals issued by the governmental entity applying

7 and responses to the request, if any;

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9 (xiii) Additional information requested by the

10 council.

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12 9-12-1504. Challenge process.

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- 14 (a) Within three (3) business days of the close of 15 the funding application process, the council shall publish
- 16 on its official website the proposed geographic broadband
- 17 service area and the proposed broadband service speeds for
- 18 each application submitted. An existing broadband service
- 19 provider may, within thirty (30) days of publication of the
- 20 information, submit in writing to the council a challenge
- 21 to an application. A challenge shall contain information
- 22 demonstrating that:

23

1 (i) The provider currently provides or has begun 2 construction or undertaken permitting or other significant 3 steps toward construction to provide broadband service 4 comparable to that in the proposed project at speeds equal to or greater than the speeds proposed in the application 5 and with other capabilities and project size comparable to 6 the project proposed in the application; or 7 8 9 (ii) The provider commits to complete 10 construction of broadband infrastructure and provide broadband service comparable to that in 11 the proposed 12 project at speeds equal to or greater than the speeds 13 proposed in the application and with other capabilities and 14 project size comparable to the project proposed in the application no later than eighteen (18) months after the 15 16 funding determinations are to be made under this section for the application submitted. 17 18 19 council shall evaluate the information (b) The 20 submitted in a provider's challenge under this section, and 21 is prohibited from funding a project if the council determines the provider is currently providing broadband 22 service or the provider's commitment to provide broadband 23

- 1 service that meets the requirements of subsection (a) of
- 2 this section in the proposed project area is credible.

4 (c) If the council denies funding to an applicant as a result of a broadband service provider's challenge made 5 under this section, and the broadband service provider does 6 not fulfill the provider's commitment to provide broadband 7 service in the project area, the council is prohibited from 8 9 denying funding to an applicant as a result of a challenge 10 by the same broadband service provider for the following two (2) fiscal years, unless the council determines that 11 12 the broadband service provider's failure to fulfill the 13 provider's commitment was the result of factors beyond the

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18 (a) In evaluating applications and providing funding
19 under this article, the council shall give highest priority
20 to applications which the council determines are public
21 private partnerships.

22

1 (b) In evaluating applications and entering into agreements to provide funding, the council shall give 2 3 priority to applications that meet one (1) or more of the 4 following criteria, with additional priority given for 5 meeting multiple criteria: 6 7 (i) Offer new or substantially upgraded 8 broadband service to important community institutions and businesses; 9 10 11 (ii) Serve economically distressed areas of the state, as measured by indices of unemployment, poverty or 12 population loss that are significantly greater than the 13 14 statewide average; 15 16 (iii) Include a component to actively promote the adoption of the newly available broadband services in 17 18 the community; 19 20 (iv) Provide evidence of strong support for the 21 project from citizens, government, businesses and 22 institutions in the community;

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1	(v) Provide access to broadband service to a
2	greater number of unserved households and businesses;
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4	(vi) Provide comparability to service offered in
5	urban areas, both in speed and pricing as determined by the
6	Federal Communications Commission;
7	
8	(vii) Provide access to very high speed
9	broadband service to business districts or other business
10	areas and are likely to secure economic benefits for the
11	surrounding locality; or
12	
13	(viii) Leverage greater amounts of funding for
14	the project from other private and public sources.
15	
16	(c) The council shall endeavor to award grants under
17	this section to qualified applicants in geographically
18	diverse regions of the state.
19	
20	9-2-1506. Limitations.
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22	(a) No agreement under this article may fund more
23	than fifty percent (50%) of the total cost of a project. At

least ten percent (10%) of the project cost shall be 1 2 matched in total by the governmental entity or governmental 3 entities submitting the application. The council may reduce 4 the minimum local governmental match based upon the merits of the project. Grant funds from other state or federal 5 grant programs may be used to meet the fifty percent (50%) 6 minimum matching requirement under this article, but shall 7 8 not be used to provide the minimum match required of governmental entities under this subsection unless the 9 10 council determines the governmental entity is unable to otherwise provide the match. 11 12 13 (b) No single project shall exceed five million 14 dollars (\$5,000,000.00) in funding provided under this 15 article. 16 17 9-2-1507. Application evaluation report.

19 (a) By June 30 of each year, following adoption of 20 the state broadband enhancement plan, the council shall 21 publish on its website and provide to the joint minerals, 22 business and economic development interim committee a list

of all applications for funding under this article received 1 2 during the previous year and, for each application: 3 4 (i) The results of any quantitative weighting 5 scheme or scoring system the council used to fund the applications; 6 7 8 (ii) The amount of funding requested; and 9 (iii) The funding provided under this article, 10 11 if any. 12 13 (b) Within ninety (90) days after a project's proposed completion date, the council shall review the 14 15 project and provide in the report under subsection (a) of 16 this section, its determination of whether the project was 17 completed and services rendered in accordance with the 18 agreement under this article. If the council reports that 19 a project was not completed or services are not being 20 rendered in accordance with an agreement, it shall report 21 actions it has taken to enforce the agreement. 22

9-12-1508. Minimum broadband speeds; rulemaking.

2 The council shall establish by rule minimum business and 3 residential upload and download speeds which broadband 4 projects must meet upon completion of construction to qualify for funding under this article. In establishing 5 speeds the council shall consider 6 minimum established by the federal communications commission as 7 8 minimums necessary to be considered "advanced 9 telecommunications capability" and speeds needed to attract 10 businesses to Wyoming communities. Speeds adopted by the council shall meet or 11 exceed a download speed of 12 twenty-five (25) megabits per second and an upload speed of 13 three (3) megabits per second. For projects primarily 14 serving business entities the minimum speed adopted by the 15 council shall be one (1) gigabits per second download speed 16 and one hundred (100) megabits per second upload speed, 17 commencing January 1, 2022.

9-12-1509. Advisory council; broadband coordinator.

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21 (a) The business council shall, in consultation with 22 the economically needed diversity options for Wyoming 23 (ENDOW) executive council, establish a broadband advisory

council consisting of eleven (11) members. One (1) member 1 2 shall be the state chief information officer or his 3 Remaining members shall be appointed by the designee. 4 council from the public at-large, with geographic diversity and to include diverse interests, including backgrounds in 5 economic development, state or local government entities, 6 broadband providers, technology related businesses, health 7 8 care, education, library services and public safety. At least one (1) representative of the Northern Arapaho or 9 10 Eastern Shoshone tribes of the Wind River Reservation shall be appointed to the advisory council. 11 12 One (1) senator appointed by the president of the senate 13 and one (1) representative appointed by the speaker of the 14 house shall serve as legislative liaisons to the advisory 15 council. Legislative liaisons shall be paid salary, per 16 and mileage as provided in W.S. 28-5-101 when 17 attending meetings of the advisory council. Members of the advisory council shall receive no salary, but shall be 18 19 reimbursed under W.S. 9-3-102 and 9-3-103 for per diem and 20 travel expenses incurred in the performance of their 21 duties.

(b) The advisory council shall provide advice and 1 2 make recommendations to the council on the following 3 subjects: 4 5 (i) The development of an inventory and map of current broadband availability, as provided by voluntary 6 submission from broadband providers and derived from other 7 8 resources, including Federal Communications Commission reports, and identification of areas of the state unserved 9 10 by broadband technology; 11 12 (ii) Needs, practices and technologies for providing broadband services in the most efficient manner 13 possible, to accommodate economic growth, diversification 14 and development, and enhance education opportunities; 15 16 17 (iii) Coordination with the ENDOW executive council, the state chief information officer and local and 18 19 tribal governmental entities to ensure that state and local 20 policies are conducive to development of broadband 21 services; 22

1 (iv) Applications received under this article, 2 as requested by the council; 3 4 (v) Propose to the council: 5 (A) A state broadband enhancement plan, for 6 adoption by the council not later than September 1, 2018; 7 8 9 (B) Not later than March 1, 2020, propose 10 recommended changes to upload and download speeds specified 11 in the definition of unserved areas, including unserved 12 residential and business corridors. 13 14 (c) The business council shall, in consultation with 15 the ENDOW executive council and the governor's office, 16 designate an employee of the business council coordinator of broadband services. The person designated 17 shall have expertise in telecommunications and specifically 18 19 in the provision of broadband services. As directed by the 20 business council, the coordinator shall staff the broadband 21 advisory council. The coordinator shall, with approval of 22 the council, accomplish the tasks set forth in paragraphs 23 (b)(i) through (v) of this section and undertake other

duties as assigned by the council in consultation with the 1 2 governor's office. The council may contract with a 3 consultant to provide services to the broadband advisory 4 council and to the business council under this act. 5 Section 2.
