A BILL

for

AN ACT relating to the provision of health care; requiring a 1 2 study of high Wyoming hospital costs and discrimination by the federal Medicare program against Wyoming residents and 3 Wyoming health care providers; requiring a study of the 4 5 impacts of the discrimination; requiring a study relating to 6 health care services and funding as specified; requiring a 7 study of the loss of medical services in Wyoming and the use of out-of-state providers to provide medical services to 8 Wyoming residents; providing an appropriation; and providing 9 10 for an effective date.

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12 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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14 Section 1.

1 The office of the governor, with the assistance of (a) 2 qualified persons or contractors hired for the purpose, shall 3 perform the studies required by this section and include the 4 studies in the report required by this section. 5 (b) The governor, with the assistance of qualified 6 persons or contractors, shall study and report on the 7 8 following topics: 9 10 (i) Identify the cost shift in the Medicare 11 prospective payment system (PPS) context to commercial 12 insurers, self-insured businesses and private payors caused 13 by Medicare and other payors who reimburse or pay less than the costs incurred by a health care provider or hospital in 14 15 providing a service; 16 17 (ii) Identify the cost shift in the critical access hospitals context, as defined by Medicare, to 18 19 commercial insurers, self-insured businesses and private 20 payors caused by Medicare and other payors who reimburse or

pay less than the costs incurred by a health care provider or

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hospital in providing a service;

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1 (iii) Identify how actual costs and charges paid 2 in Wyoming by Medicare and by commercial insurers compare to 3 similar payments made in surrounding states and in a sample 4 of community and academic medical hospitals in coastal states 5 for common medical procedures and for those procedures where 6 a patient from Wyoming is most likely to receive the procedure out-of-state; 7 8 9 (iv) Identify or estimate total health care 10 spending for all Wyoming residents and identify how much of 11 that spending occurs outside of Wyoming. Identify whether 12 the percentage of out-of-state spending is likely to change 13 and, if so, the likely reasons for the change; 14 15 Identify what types of medical care, if any, 16 may become no longer economically or medically viable in 17 Wyoming as a result of out-of-state competition. the health risks to Wyoming residents which may result from 18 19 any reduction in the identified types of medical care. 20 requested by the governor or a contractor, the department of 21 health shall provide assistance in providing the analysis required by this paragraph; 22

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1 (vi) Any difficulties in recruiting physicians and 2 other health care providers created by low reimbursements in 3 general, and low Medicare reimbursements in particular; 4 5 (vii) The reasons for high hospital costs in Wyoming. The validity and influence of the following factors 6 and answers to the following questions, which may contribute 7 8 to Wyoming's high hospital costs, shall be analyzed and considered: 9 10 11 (A) To what extent does there exist in 12 Wyoming an inadequate volume of patients to spread fixed hospital costs, including capital costs, fixed or per unit 13 administrative costs and costs of specialized medical teams; 14 15 16 (B) Do high professional labor costs and 17 difficulties recruiting professional labor due to a lack of urban amenities and appropriate employment opportunities for 18 19 professional spouses contribute to high hospital costs? Do 20 these factors result in hospitals paying higher wages or 21 paying the very high costs of retaining temporary traveling 22 professionals;

1	(C) Do inefficiencies in hospital operations
2	cause high hospital costs that could be controlled with better
3	management? Does a lack of competitive cost pressure, caused
4	in part by the isolated nature of many Wyoming hospitals and
5	the fact that few health care options exist outside of a
6	single hospital in many Wyoming communities, contribute to
7	this problem;
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9	(D) Do excessive profits lead to high
10	hospital costs in Wyoming;
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12	(E) Does Wyoming provide less state and local
13	support to hospitals than other states? This support includes
14	Medicaid at the state level, local mill levies (either part
15	of the county mill levy or hospital district mill levies),
16	state programs to compensate hospitals for uncompensated care
17	and, outside Wyoming, municipal support for hospitals;
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19	(F) Does uncompensated care, including bad
20	debt, raise Wyoming's hospital costs as compared to other
21	states;
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1	(G) Is it possible that in Centers for
2	Medicare and Medicaid Services 2014 data or other more recent
3	data sets, Wyoming's nursing home costs may be being shifted
4	to the hospital category, increasing reported hospital costs,
5	decreasing nursing home costs and other anomalous features of
6	the data collection in any data set used;
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8	(H) Does the number of critical access
9	hospitals in Wyoming (25 beds or less, frequently with a low
10	patient census) contribute to Wyoming's high hospital costs
11	relative to other states;
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13	(J) Does prolonged care provided to mental
14	health patients at Wyoming hospitals create additional
15	hospital costs in Wyoming? To what extent are these
16	additional costs caused by the inadequate availability of
17	mental health treatment options outside the hospital;
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19	(K) Are there institutional forces,
20	including network provider requirements within the Wyoming
21	state employees' and officials' group insurance plan and
22	network requirements of private health insurance providers,
23	that cause Wyoming residents to seek hospital care out-of-

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4	(M) Do any Wyoming statutes, rules or
5	regulations cause an unnecessary increase in hospital costs
6	in Wyoming.
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8	(viii) What share of Wyoming's total hospital
9	costs are generated by critical access hospitals;
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11	(ix) Opportunities to broaden the payor base
12	relating to Wyoming health care services, including
13	alternative funding mechanisms and innovative strategies for
14	reducing health care costs.
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16	(c) The following entities shall coordinate with the
17	governor's office and any persons or contractors hired by the
18	governor's office and shall provide reports and analyses for
19	inclusion in the reports required by this section as follows:
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21	(i) The department of health shall, based on its
22	professional knowledge and other reliable research, analyze

2 (A) The effect on Wyoming patients in terms

3 of mortality, morbidity and general well-being of receiving

4 medical care in their home community, as opposed to receiving

5 care in a distant location;

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7 (B) Identification of the most common,

8 serious medical conditions treated in Wyoming's larger

9 communities and identification of those medical conditions

10 which pose significant mortality or morbidity risks if

11 treatment becomes unavailable in a Wyoming community and a

12 patient is required to travel elsewhere to obtain the

13 treatment. Consideration shall be given to the risks of both

14 travel time under normal travel conditions and travel when

15 weather or other factors delay or temporarily prevent safe

16 travel.

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18 (ii) The attorney general shall consider and

19 report to the governor on the following:

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21 (A) Whether legal action over Medicare's low

22 and discriminatory reimbursement practices in Wyoming could

23 provide relief from the problems created by the low and

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1	discriminatory	reimbursement	practices.	The	attorney	general

- 2 shall provide information about the identity of the proper
- 3 plaintiff in any legal action;

- 5 (B) Whether legal precedents supporting
- 6 public utility rate regulation and other regulatory
- 7 mechanisms have or could have any application to Medicare
- 8 reimbursement rates and could serve as a basis for regulating
- 9 Medicare reimbursement in Wyoming or requiring fair Medicare
- 10 reimbursement rates;

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- 12 (C) The report and analysis required by this
- 13 paragraph does not require a definitive answer on the subjects
- 14 analyzed but does seek a recommendation as to whether the
- 15 state should spend the resources necessary to more fully
- 16 determine if legal action should be pursued.

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- 18 (d) The governor, or at the governor's direction the
- 19 persons or consultants hired by the governor pursuant to this
- 20 section, shall compile all reports and analyses required by
- 21 this section, together with any recommendations that he and
- 22 the consultants or persons may have, into a single report
- 23 that shall be provided to the joint labor, health and social

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1	services interim committee, the joint appropriations
2	committee and to the legislative service office on or before
3	October 1, 2019. The governor shall determine if the report
4	will be a final report, or if the report shall be a
5	preliminary report with a final report to be submitted on or
6	before August 1, 2020. In submitting any report, the governor
7	may include or exclude any portion of the analysis provided
8	by the attorney general under paragraph (c)(ii) of this
9	section in order to comply with the law or to not jeopardize
10	any legal claim recommended by the attorney general.

12 Section 2.

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14 (a) The governor:

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16 (i) May create a steering committee to advise on 17 the issues identified in section 1 of this act and to help direct any of the duties or tasks imposed by section 1 of 18 19 this act. The steering committee shall consist of at least 20 one (1) member of the senate appointed by the president of the senate, one (1) member of the house of representatives 21 22 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and additional membership as the governor deems appropriate; 23

(ii) May assign to the steering committee or any state agency he deems appropriate, or otherwise delegate to anyone he deems appropriate, any duty or task assigned to the governor under section 1 of this act.

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7 Section 3. There is appropriated two hundred thousand 8 dollars (\$200,000.00) from the general fund to the governor. 9 This appropriation shall be for the period beginning with the effective date of this act and ending June 30, 2021. 10 11 appropriation shall only be expended to contract with 12 qualified persons to provide the studies, analyses and reports required by this act and for assembling, reproducing 13 and distributing the reports required by this 14 act. 15 any other provision Notwithstanding of law, this 16 appropriation shall not be transferred or expended for any 17 other purpose and any unexpended, unobligated funds remaining from this appropriation shall revert as provided by law on 18 June 30, 2021. 19

Section 4. This act is effective immediately upon completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming Constitution.
