Source of revenue (decrease):

The revenue decrease would come from the collection of fewer fees due to an anticipated reduction in the number of new applicants and out of state licenses.

Assumptions:

The Board of Psychology (Board) anticipates that a number of new applicants and current out-of-state license holders may not need to have and maintain a license in Wyoming due to participation in the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (Compact). The Board does not know the exact number but assumes a scenario where all current out-of-state license holders may choose to not renew their Wyoming license due to participation in the Compact, and a percent of new applicants residing in Compact states would not need to be licensed in Wyoming. If the Board does experience a revenue decrease, it may seek to increase its application, license and renewals fees. The estimate presented in the table above is based on the following assumptions:

- Revenue Decrease, new license holders, annual amount
 - o 11 new license holders x \$275 current application fee = \$3,025
 - o 11 new license holders x \$200 current license fee = \$2,200
- Revenue Decrease, renewals
 - o For FY 2021, 89 license holders x \$200 current renewal fee = \$17,800
 - o For FY 2022, 13 license holders x \$200 current renewal fee = \$2,600
 - o For FY 2023, 59 license holders x \$200 current renewal fee = \$11,800

Source of expenditure increase:

Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact annual assessment per license holder.

Assumptions:

Assuming the current Wyoming license holders apply for compact authorization, the Board will pay \$10 per license holder to the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact Commission, per year.

- 124 current license holders x \$10 fee = \$1,240 annual assessment

The bill requires background checks for new applicants which may result in a fee increase to cover the cost. The Attorney General's Office notes that on its own, this bill will not result in a significant revenue increase from background check fees or require additional personnel and/or funding. However, passage of multiple bills of this type may result in a cumulative administrative impact to the Division of Criminal Investigation.

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
