A BILL

for

- 1 AN ACT relating to legal time; requiring an application for
- 2 the state to transfer time zones as specified; establishing
- 3 a new uniform state time; specifying contingencies; making
- 4 legislative findings; and providing for an effective date.

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6 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

8 Section 1.

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10 (a) The legislature finds that:

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- 12 (i) The federal Standard Time Act of 1918, P.L.
- 13 65-106, 40 Stat. 450, established standard time zones for
- 14 the United States bounded by designated meridian lines,
- 15 including the zone designated as United States standard

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- 1 mountain time in which the state of Wyoming is placed, and
- 2 the standard time zone designations have since become
- 3 geographic names of regional identity;

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- 5 (ii) The federal Uniform Time Act of 1966, P.L.
- 6 89-387, 80 Stat. 107, 15 U.S.C. 260 et seq., was enacted by
- 7 Congress to promote the adoption and observance of uniform
- 8 time within the standard time zones of the United States.
- 9 It standardized an annual one (1) hour advancement from
- 10 standard time in April of each year, commonly called
- 11 "daylight saving time," and an annual return to standard
- 12 time approximately six (6) months later. A 2005 amendment
- 13 to the Federal Uniform Time Act of 1966, P.L. 109-58, 119
- 14 Stat. 594, adjusted the daylight saving advancement date to
- 15 mid-March and the return date to early November;

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- 17 (iii) The federal Uniform Time Act of 1966
- 18 authorizes a state that is entirely situated within one (1)
- 19 time zone, as the state of Wyoming is, to exempt itself
- 20 from the change to daylight saving time as long as it does

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21 so uniformly as an entire state;

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1 (iv) The residents and businesses of the state 2 of Wyoming have become more habituated to the eight (8) 3 months of daylight saving time per year than the four (4) 4 months of standard time per year; and 5 The biannual change of time between mountain 6 standard time and mountain daylight time is disruptive to 7 commerce and to the daily schedules of the residents of the 8 9 state of Wyoming. 10 11 Section 2. 12 (a) Upon the enactment of a law similar to this act 13 that authorizes an application for the same time zone 14 change in Montana, Idaho, Utah and Colorado, the governor 15 16 shall apply to the United States secretary 17 transportation for the state of Wyoming to be transferred to the zone designated as United States standard central 18 19 time by the federal Standard Time Act of 1918. 20 21 (b) Upon approval of a transfer to the zone 22 designated as United States standard central time by the

United States secretary of transportation, the uniform time

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1 within the state of Wyoming shall be coordinated universal

2 time offset by six (6) hours throughout the year. The

3 state of Wyoming shall then exempt itself from the

4 provisions of federal law providing for the advancement of

5 time.

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7 (c) Upon approval of a transfer to the zone

8 designated as United States standard central time by the

9 United States secretary of transportation, the uniform time

10 within the state of Wyoming shall be known as mountain

11 daylight saving time unless the other states applying for a

12 time zone change uniformly select another name for the

13 uniform time.

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15 **Section 3.** This act is effective immediately upon

16 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law

17 as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming

18 Constitution.
