A BILL

for

AN ACT relating to the administration of government; providing legislative findings; specifying duties and restrictions for state agencies and governmental entities in response to a federal executive order that requires conservation efforts by 2030; prohibiting the use of funding and resources as specified; and providing for an

7 effective date.

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9 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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11 Section 1.

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13 (a) The legislature finds that:

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1 (i) Wyoming has a long tradition of conserving 2 its land and natural resources while responsibly promoting 3 multiple uses of land, maintaining wildlife habitat and 4 preserving resources; 5 (ii) Wyoming's farmers and ranchers have 6 7 consistently and dutifully cared and continue to care for 8 the land and water in Wyoming, and are the original conservationists and good stewards of Wyoming's abundant 9 10 resources; 11 12 (iii) Wyoming has always held private property rights in the highest regard, including enshrining certain 13 rights and protections for private property owners in 14 article 1, sections 32, 33 and 39 of the 15 Constitution; 16 17 18 (iv) The principles of private property 19 ownership have been critical to the success of Wyoming's 20 top industries, including agriculture and mining;

1 (v) On January 27, 2021, President Joseph R.

2 Biden, Jr. enacted Executive Order 14,008, entitled

3 "Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad";

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5 (vi) Section 216 of the executive order

6 establishes a goal of "conserving at least 30 percent of

7 our lands and waters by 2030";

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9 (vii) Achieving the goal of conserving thirty

10 percent (30%) of the nation's land and water by 2030 would

11 require conserving a land area several times larger than

12 the size of Wyoming;

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14 (viii) The federal government's thirty percent

15 (30%) conservation goal would interfere with the states'

16 constitutional and traditional power over land and water

17 uses;

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19 (ix) A federal conservation mandate of this

20 magnitude has great potential to devastate Wyoming's

21 economy and industries; and

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1 (x) The people of the state of Wyoming oppose 2 federal overreach and believe that the state has the 3 authority and duty to manage and maintain Wyoming's land 4 and water resources and to ensure their productivity for 5 years to come. 6 7 **Section 2.** W.S. 9-14-104 is created to read: 8 9 9-14-104. Limitations on efforts and the expenditure 10 of public funds for federal conservation efforts. 11 (a) As used in this section, "governmental entity" 12 means the state of Wyoming, any state agency and any local 13 governmental entity. 14 15 16 (b) Each governmental entity in Wyoming shall take 17 all reasonable steps necessary to resist and prevent the 18 federal government's attempt to usurp the state of 19 Wyoming's authority as the federal government attempts to 20 implement section 216 of Executive Order 14,008.

(c) The department of revenue shall:

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1 (i) Host not less than three (3) workshops to 2 help county commissioners, assessors and treasurers 3 understand the tax consequences of conservation easements 4 and preservation easements; 5 (ii) In consultation with each county assessor 6 and the Wyoming wildlife and natural resource trust, work 7 to identify existing conservation easements in Wyoming and 8 9 maintain an inventory of conservation easements to assist 10 county assessors in accurately determining land values for 11 purposes of assessment and taxation. 12 The department of agriculture shall: 13 (d) 14 15 (i) Develop and maintain on its website a list 16 of local governmental entities that have passed resolutions 17 opposing the goal expressed in section 216 of federal executive order 14,008 of conserving thirty percent (30%) 18 19 of the nation's land and water resources; 20 21 (ii) Develop and maintain on its website a list of local governmental entities that have passed resolutions 22

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supporting or otherwise voting to endorse the goal of

1 conserving thirty percent (30%) of the nation's land and

2 water resources;

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4 (iii) Coordinate with the United States

department of agriculture to ensure that the United States 5

department of agriculture is seeking the required local and 6

state approvals for conservation easements related to the 7

federal agriculture conservation easement program, the 8

9 federal working lands for wildlife program, the federal

10 wetlands reserve program and other federal programs that

provide for or authorize conservation or preservation 11

12 easements.

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14 (e) The director of the department of agriculture is

hereby designated as Wyoming's state coordinator for the 15

16 climate task force established in section 4 of the federal

17 department of the interior secretarial order

18 promulgated on April 16, 2021.

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20 (f) Except as otherwise provided in this section, no

staff 21 governmental entity shall use public funds or

resources for projects that involve perpetual conservation 22

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easements. Nothing in this subsection shall: 23

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2	(i) Preclude any holder defined in W.S.
3	34-1-201(b)(ii)(B) from seeking or creating a conservation
4	easement under the Uniform Conservation Easement Act;
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6	(ii) Preclude or prohibit the Wyoming wildlife
7	and natural resource trust account board from entering into
8	agreements for the creation of conservation easements in
9	accordance with the Wyoming Wildlife and Natural Resource
10	Funding Act.
11	
12	(g) Any state governmental entity shall seek the
13	approval of the governor before using public funds or staff
14	resources for projects involving a conservation easement
15	with a specified term of years.
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17	Section 3. This act is effective immediately upon
18	completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law
19	as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming
20	Constitution.
